Intercolonial delegates will be entertained by the City Council.

Yesterday afternoon a special meeting of the Executive decided to render due honor to the Intercolonial delegates on their visit to this city.

Next Wednesday they will be the guests of the Lord-Governor, the Niagara Falls River Electric Railway Company and the Toronto Board of Trade.

On Thursday, after breakfasting with the Lord-Governor at Government House, there will be a civic reception at the City Hall, followed by a three hours' drive around the city and visit to the public institutions.

As the day is the glorious Twelfth it will be arranged that the distinguished visitors shall see the Orangemen's procession either at Queen's Park or at the Exhibition grounds.

The Civic Luncheon.

At 2 o'clock the council will give a luncheon in honor of the delegates at the Queen's Hotel, to which the members of council, ex-Mayors and heads of civic departments will be invited.

Cards of invitation will also be extended to the local members of the Provincial and Dominion Parliaments, the judiciary and representatives of education, railways, military, banking and other public institutions.

Shaw, who presided at yesterday's meeting, said the Mayor had reason to believe that Lord Randolph and Lady Churchill, who are on a tour through States and Canada, would join the Intercolonial delegates at Niagara and pay a visit to Toronto the next day, before proceeding by the C.P.R. to the Pacific Coast. Hallam, Lamb, Crawford, McMurich, Burns, Shaw and Dunn.

GAVE ALL HE HAD.

Put His \$37,000 Into a Church, and Now He is Its Janitor.

"Denver has the extraordinary instance of a man who gave his entire fortune toward the building of a church and then became its janitor," said William S. Graham recently. "It is nothing unusual to see the man who gave a large donation to the church become a leader in the congregation; but here is a man who gave every cent of the \$37,000 he had accumulated and was then content to serve in a lowly position with a small salary. This is a rare instance of self-sacrifice and particularly interesting to Pittsburghers, as the noble man at one period in his life spent his time between Alliance and this city."

"Many years ago there resided in Alliance, O., a man who, in order to make a better living for himself and wife, opened a restaurant in addition to his regular duties as engineer on the Fort Wayne road between Pittsburgh and the native town. He gained a little money in the pursuit of his vocations, but when the Western fever broke out and Denver was looming up out of the haze of the setting sun as the coming metropolis of the West he packed up his earthly possessions and started for that growing place. With the little savings he had taken with him he purchased a home surrounded by some little property. As luck would have it, a portion of the land adjoining his house suddenly became very valuable and he sold it at a great profit. Having acquired taste for real estate he bought and sold, always being successful, until his savings had increased to what in those days, and we might say even now, were thought to be a considerable fortune—\$37,000. But the engineer's path was not to be all roses, for about this time his wife died, leaving him alone in the world. He mourned her loss very bitterly. Feeling that he should do some good in the world he became very much interested in church work.

The Christian Church at Denver had been very successful, but after acquiring a considerable congregation the work seemed at a standstill. The pastor had received a call from another city, and was about to accept it when the Pittsburgh engineer came to him and argued that his proposed going away was ill advised. 'For,' he contended, 'while the church has increased rapidly, we are now at a standstill. What we need now is a counter irritant to stir up the people for the good work. Establish another Christian Church here, and you will see what great good can be done. The minister concurred in this opinion, but could see no way to accomplish the establishment of another church, as funds were very scarce. With this the engineer agreed to donate \$12,000 toward purchasing a lot, and to build a new church. If the pastor would re-sign, this offer was accepted; soon a lot was obtained, and in a short time the tent which was erected to hold the services held an earnest congregation of seventy. Interest in the work increased, and building soon commenced. So interested did the engineer become that he not only gave his promised \$12,000, but kept adding and adding to his donation until, when the \$35,000 church was completed, he had given every cent he had in the world, \$37,000, leaving himself utterly without money or means of support. The church proved to be one of the finest in Denver, and to this day the pride of the city.

"But what was this benevolent man to do? He had given his all to the church, but he must live. He went meekly and asked for the position of janitor. Of course he was accepted, and to this day he is filling that position. But he is no ordinary janitor; he is rather a king in the congregation. He is about 70 years old, and lives in the church. Away up in the belfry which he built he has a comfortable bedroom arranged, and down in the basement he eats his meals. He receives a salary, but every cent that is not required for his frugal living he gives to the alma mater. I said upon he is looked upon as a king. On every question which comes up about the church his opinion is asked for and respected. He is content with his life, having made a sacrifice of himself and his wealth to the great cause. I doubt if another such instance of self-sacrifice can be found in recent times."—Pittsburgh Dispatch.
