'Observer,' VARIOUS WAYS OF SERVING PO-Potatoes are such a homely vegetable that they do not receive proper con-sideration. Potatoes should be boiled thirty minutes, and baked forty-five

thirty minutes, and baked forty-five minutes. It is a mistake for a house-wife to take for granted that her cook knows how to boil potatoes. She should be questioned, and if her meth-od is not the correct one she should be instructed to follow this rule: Twelve medium sized potatoes, one tablespoonful of salt, boiling water to cover. Pare the potatoes, and if old, let stand in cold water an hour or two to freshen them. Boil fifteen minutes, then add salt and boil fifteen minutes, then add salt and boil fifteen minutes longer. Pour off every drop of water. Take the cover from the saucepan and shake the potatoes in a gurrent of cold air. Place the sauce
