VARIOUS WAYS OF SERVING POTATOES. Potatoes are such a honey vegetable that they do not receive proper credit. They can be served in many ways. Thirty minutes, and baked forty-five minutes. It is a mistake for a housewife to take for granted that her cook knows how to boil potatoes. She should be questioned, and if her method is not the correct one she should be instructed in following this rule: Twelve medium sized potatoes, one tablespoonful of salt, boiling water to cover. Pare the potatoes, and if old, let stand in cold water an hour or two to freshen them. Boil fifteen minutes in salted water and boil fifteen minutes longer. Pour off every drop of water. Take the cover from the saucepan and shake the potatoes in a current of cold air. Place the same pan on the back part of the stove and cover with a clean, coarse towel until serving time. The sooner the potatoes are served the better.

WHY WOMEN ARE YOUNGER.
