The following statement issued by a committee of the surviving passengers of the Titanic was given to the press on the arrival of the Carpathia at New York: bound for New York, and Mr. Frazee

"We, the undersigned surviving passengers from the S. S. Titanic in order to forestall any sensational or exaggerated statements, deem it our duty to give to the press a statement of facts which have come to our knowledge and which we believe to be true.

"The English Board of Trade passengers' certificate out the country. on board the Titanic allowed for a total of approximately 3,500. The same certificate called for life-boat accommodation for approximately 950 in the following boats:---14 large life-boats, two smaller boats and four collapsible boats. Life preservers were accessible and apparently in sufficient number for all on board.


