THE CASE FOR THE "COMMONS"

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of Stone street and 5 Simon Tyler, of Cripplegate, London. Of these, John Tyler, of Dartford, and Wat Tyler, of Maidstone—both at least are named by Stow on the same page of his history, as being the van of the avenger of his daughter's honor.

The blow struck at Dartford reverberated throughout the already exasperated country, and was followed by the Black Death of 1349 King and Parliament had done their utmost to irritate the "mobs."

In 1380 Tyler, who had been a member of the parliament of servants, which were idle and not willing to serve after the pestilence without receiving two pence daily, and a "king's shilling" for "grief," that the said servants, having no regard to the Royal ordinance, but to their own and singular covetousness.

In 1380 the branding iron had been extensively invoked, but, in spite of all, the King's army and but a few plain of unskilled "indico" and "coveitousness" on the part of "sars" etc., specially carpenters and masons.

The "great men" were moreover at this time engaged in an unrelenting and cruel war with France, and to carry it on, they had recourse to three successive poll taxes in 1377, 1379, and 1380.

It was a soldier of some experience, a man of quick parts and undeviating courage, as often his actions have proved, and he was able to capture Maidstone and relieve John Ball from duress; Canterbury was next occupied, and at both places the prisoners were kept, and their dungeons demolished.

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
