KNOWLTON, QUE. A new academy
 building is spoken of.

BRUNNER, ONT.—The Germans will
 build a new church here.

ATHERLEY, ONT.—The Methodists
 will probably erect a new church.

MIAMI, MAN.—Mr. S. Cowan will
 rebuild his hotel recently destroyed by
 fire.

LISTOWEL, ONT. A site is about to be
 purchased on which to erect new market
 buildings.

STADACONA, QUE. The question of
 the construction of waterworks is under
 consideration.

CAPE VINCENT, ONT. The authorities
 of Riverside cemetery contemplate the
 construction of a vault.

RICHMOND HILL, ONT. Messrs. Post
 & Holmes, architects, are preparing plans
 for a R. C. church to be built here.

GANANOQUE, ONT.—Mr. J. Dempster
 has purchased the West End store prop-
 erty, with the intention of rebuilding in
 the spring.

QUEBEC, QUE.—Extensive alterations
 are to be made to the St. Louis hotel,
 including new furniture throughout, at a
 cost of \$30,000.

OSHAWA, ONT. A new R. C. church
 is to be built here. Plans are being pre-
 pared by Messrs. Post & Holmes, archi-
 tects, of Toronto.

BURLINGTON, ONT.—Mr. W. G.
 Nelles, Village Clerk, invites tenders until
 the 22nd inst. for the erection of an engine
 house and hose tower.

STRATFORD, ONT.—A movement is on
 foot looking to the erection of a House of
 Refuge for the city. Already the sum of
 \$3,000 has been subscribed.

TORONTO JUNCTION, ONT.—Mr. J.
 Barnes has had plans prepared for a large
 hotel to be erected on the corner of
 Campbell avenue and Davenport road.

DESERONTO, ONT.—Dr. Oronhyatekha,
 of Toronto, has purchased Capt. John's
 Island, half a mile from this town, and
 will erect a number of cottages thereon.

VICTORIA, B. C.—A by-law has been
 passed by the Council authorizing that a
 sum of money not exceeding \$100,000 be
 raised by way of loan for sewerage pur-
 poses.

GATINEAU POINT, ONT.—The Village
 Council is preparing to issue debentures
 to the amount of \$5,000 for the construc-
 tion of the new bridge across the
 Gatineau river.

PICTON, ONT.—Vacancies are open for
 an electrician, lineman, engineer and fire
 man for the waterworks and electric light
 system. Particulars may be obtained

HILLS GREEN, ONT. Mr. William
 McAllister invites tenders until the 23rd

 meeting of the School Board, it was de-

 a by-law to the ratepayers to raise the
 sum of \$80,000 to complete the school
 building.

ST. HYACINTHE, QUE.—At a recent
 public meeting of citizens it was decided
 to form a joint stock company to erect a
 large hotel on the site of the present
 Yamaska hotel. The stock of the compa-
 ny is to be \$50,000.

GLENCOE, ONT. Mr. A. Code, Civil
 Engineer, of this place, will have charge
 of the drainage work to be constructed
 during the coming summer in the town-
 ships of Brooke, Dawn and Enniskillen,
 in Lambton County. The cost will be
 about \$50,000.

KINGSTON, ONT. Mr. C. J. Graham
 has purchased the Robinson property on
 the corner of Union and Wellington sts.
 and will erect two brick residences there-
 on during the coming summer.—Arthur
 Ellis, architect, wants tenders for altera-
 tions to two houses at Williamsville for
 Mr. J. Haffner.

HALIFAX, N. S. The erection of a
 new building for an Infants' Home is
 under consideration.—The Halifax Shovel
 Company will rebuild their works in the
 spring.—Tenders are invited by the
 Board of Works until Monday, March
 26th, for the supply of a quantity of
 cement not exceeding 2,500 barrels.
 Particulars may be obtained from Mr.
 Wm. F. Reilly, Assistant Clerk of City
 Works.

OHAWA, ONT.—The Public School
 Board is considering the erection of a
 new school on Theodore street near King
 street. A meeting of the promoters of the
 Maternity Hospital was held a few days
 ago at which a Committee was appointed
 to take steps to secure the erection of a
 suitable building.—The Dominion Gov-
 ernment has been asked to grant a charter
 to a company to construct a railway from
 Pembroke to Renfrew.

WINNIPEG, MAN.—The surveyors have
 completed the work of locating the line
 of railway between Lethbridge and
 Macleod.—Mr. J. C. Sproule, Chairman
 Committee on Works, will receive tenders
 until Thursday, the 1st of March, for the
 supply of 500 cords of tamarac or cedar
 paving wood. A meeting of the executive
 board of the Wesley College was held on
 the 9th inst., at which the final plans for
 the new building were approved of, and a
 resolution adopted that tenders be asked
 at once for its erection.

NIAGARA FALLS, ONT.—A scheme has
 been mooted by the Niagara Falls Park
 and River Railway Company to construct
 a bridge from the Canadian side of
 Niagara River to Navy Island, thence
 to the Canadian shore. The company
 are also considering the extension of their
