DISCHARGE OF SEWAGE FROM SHIPS, ESQUIMALT HARBOUR

### Question No. 371-Mr. Anderson:

What steps have been taken to provide federal ships, including naval vessels, using Esquimalt harbour with holding tanks to eliminate the discharge of raw sewage into the harbour?

[Mr. Pepin.]

Mr. Yves Forest (Parliamentary Secretary to President of the Privy Council): I am informed that all the ships operated by the civil departments and using Esquimalt harbour regularly, except one R.C.M.P. patrol boat, are equipped so that they do not discharge raw sewage. Two older ships operated by the Department of Energy, Mines and Resources are not so equipped, but normally they do not use this harbour. The submarines and the oceanographic research ships Quest and Endeavour are the only naval vessels fitted with holding tanks.

Were tenders called for the recently awarded mail delivery contract for Placentia and St. Mary's Bay, Newfoundland and, if not, what was the basis of the award?
