What better evidence do we have today than the Canadian economy? Interest rates at an alarming rate are causing havoc among small and medium-sized businesses. The dollar is very high, affecting our exports to countries abroad. Inflation is creeping up at a quickened pace and, yes, there is high unemployment in the poorer regions of the country.

This is only to find that a government committed to an agenda of the Prime Minister will turn around and attempt to implement the provisions of the GST, the goods and services tax.

After two years since the last election and the four before that for a total of six, there is much to be said, but the unity of our country is in real danger. There are reasons for that, clear unequivocal reasons. The Prime Minister, in his macho way, has driven Canadians to the brink. I refer to the free trade debate. The guest speaker was a gentleman who lost two brothers in the Second World War and another in the Korean War. He said: "I was only a child when that occurred and I could not understand or appreciate the anguish of my parents. But as of August this year, I now know what that anguish was all about, because my eldest son has now gone to the Persian Gulf". We were denied by the Prime Minister and the Conservative majority opposite of debating that decision on the floor of the House of Commons.
