BILL TO AMEND-INSISTENCE UPON SENATE AMENDMENT

The Senate resumed from yesterday the adjourned debate on the motion of Hon. Mr. Aseltine that the Senate do not insist upon its amendment to Bill C-72, to amend the Customs Tariff, to which the House of Commons has disagreed, and that a message be sent to the House of Commons accordingly.

Hon. Walter M. Aseltine: Honourable senators, the honourable senator from Hanover (Hon. Mr. Brunt) is not present. He adjourned the debate yesterday in order to make it possible for me to ask honourable members of the Senate today for leave to make a brief statement in connection with the remarks made yesterday by the honourable Leader of the Opposition [Hon. Mr. Macdonald, (Brantford)]. If I have that privilege I would like to make the statement now.

Hon. Mr. Macdonald (Brantford): Agreed.

Hon. Mr. Aseltine: Honourable senators. no conference is possible at this stage. My motion before the house is that the Senate do not insist upon its amendment. This motion must first be disposed of, and the appropriate message sent to the other place.

Accordingly, I hope that my motion will be adopted, since this is the proper course under the circumstances, considering the type of bill we are dealing with. This, of course, would dispose of the matter.

However, should the amendment be insisted upon, the holding of a conference will depend on whether or not the other place asks for one. I have looked at the procedure prescribed in cases of this kind, and I find that that is the way in which it has always been done in the past.

Accordingly, honourable senators, my motion must now be disposed of.

I might add that, as I understand the situation at the present time, there is no hope of any compromise.
