Dear Sir,

I have received your letter of October 4th addressed to the Principal and wish to inform you that if your daughter Margarette MacGregor Obes is registered for regular studies in this Faculty she will have her tuition fees remitted by the University for the first term. The value of these fees is \$100. After the close of the first term, which is January 19th, there will be a balance of \$100 to be paid on account of tuition fees. In addition to these University charges there is a \$10 caution money fee to be paid at the beginning of the session and \$15 for student activities. I am going to write the Students' Executive Council that they follow the example of the University and make some allowance on the activities fee in such cases. As the situation stands, your daughter would need to pay only the \$10 caution money fee at the present time and settlement of any balance would not need to be made until after the second term has begun. These are the present arrangements which we are able to make,

I hope that we shall be able to enroll your daughter in the regular course.
