RAILWAYS TO END ARGUMENTS WITH THE CAR AGREEMENTS

Announcement Follows Conference With Committee of Montreal Board of Trade—Move Intended to Silence Complaints of Cities Where System Has Not Been Introduced.

MONTREAL, Oct. 16.—(Can. Press.)—Following a meeting of a committee of the Montreal Board of Trade and representatives of the railways entering Montreal, it was announced that after Dec. 31, all agreements between the railways and carriage companies for the handling of freight, will be canceled. Under no circumstances, the railways declare, will the agreement be continued after the first of the year.

"There was nothing we could do," stated one of the board of trade men after the meeting. "The railways have everything in their own hands. This agreement was made by them in the first place and can be canceled by them at any time they please. They are under no obligations to act in the capacity of carriage companies if they do not so desire."

Treat All Alike.
Opinion is to the effect that the rail-

ways have taken the step partly because handling the delivery of shipments has greatly complicated their business in the places where it has been adopted, while cities in which the system has not been introduced have been asking for it. They could not consistently be denied while Montreal, Toronto and Hamilton and others have been getting it, and as it could hardly be given to all, the railways decided to cease operations in this direction entirely.

The railway representatives at the meeting today were: For the C.P.R., Freight Traffic Manager W. R. MacInnes and Assistant Traffic Manager W. M. Kirkpatrick; for the G. T. R., Freight Traffic Manager C. E. Dewey; for the C.N.R., Traffic Manager G. H. Shaw, James Davidson, George B. Fraser, T. C. Wardlaw, James Gardner, Joseph Quintal and W. S. Tilston represented the board of trade.

OUR CIVILIZATION PRODUCT OF EAST

George E. Foster Tells of Orient at Empire Club Luncheon.

Hon. George E. Foster gave an address at the Empire Club luncheon yesterday afternoon, speaking of the eastern countries and their connection with the western countries. "The east was a region which had always aroused interest in the minds of men. They had read it from their New Testament and Bible studies. The four leading religions of the world had their origin there. The east was the country of former civilizations, which had flourished and passed away. It was from the east that the multitude of people who from time to time, had overrun the west, had come. More recently it had been in the minds of the people of the west, on account of the expansion of the British Empire, with its interests in various parts of the world. Of late the east and west have been brought into contact with each other because of the various methods of communication, for which reason the interest in each other must be greatly enlarged. Referring to trade, Mr. Foster said that commerce to the value of three billions of dollars had its origin in the Pacific Ocean."

ART EXHIBIT TO LAST TWO WEEKS

Commencing today and continuing for two weeks, a splendid exhibition of art, including excellent paintings and works in bronze and marble, will be held in the Art Metropole rooms on Yonge street. The sculpture is the work of Josef Jost, of Munich, Germany, while the works in oil and water colors are from the brush of his wife. Mr. Jost is one of the best known sculptors of the day in Germany. Several of his works are on exhibit in the greatest museums of the old land, while the paintings of his wife are characteristic of the kind of work most popular with the people of Munich at the present time. Mrs. Jost is a Canadian by birth. She was born and raised in Hamilton, Ont., where for some time she drew for The Hamilton Herald. Possessing extraordinary talent, she traveled to Munich, Germany, to study art, and here she met Mr. Jost. Having business to transact in Hamilton, Mrs. Jost and her husband brought with them, at great expense, some of their smaller works, and Mr. Jost, impressed with Toronto, chose this city as the only one in which to exhibit his and his wife's works. Immediately following the close of the exhibit, Mr. and Mrs. Jost will return to Munich, where they will take up their permanent abode.

YONGE ST. WIDENING

At a meeting of the Yonge street property owners, held last night in the office of the Staunton Paper Co., the following resolution was passed: "Resolved, that if necessary, the property owners and tenants represented by the signatures on the petition presented, will be prepared to contribute pro rata the necessary funds to prevent by all legal means the passing of the proposed bylaw for widening Yonge street above Bloor on the present basis of assessment."

BRAMWELL BOOTH WILL PREACH TWICE

In connection with the visit of Gen. W. Bramwell Booth to Toronto, an industrial gathering is expected to be held in the Massey Hall on Sunday afternoon, Nov. 2.

The general is announced to give an address, entitled, "Some Lessons of My Father's Life and Work." Sir John Gibson has consented to preside. Sir James Whitney, Mayor Hooper and many eminent persons will also be present.

Massey Hall has been secured for the entire day, and Gen. Booth will preach at 11 a.m. and 7 p.m.

TWENTY NUNS AMONG REFUGEES.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16.—(Can. Press.)—Twenty Catholic nuns, members of the Sisterhood of the Immaculate Word, are among the refugees now en route from Tampico, Mex., to Galveston, Tex., on the oil tanker Halmant and Wanet. They fled from their institution at Monterey. The tanker also had as passengers sixteen British subjects, ten Mexicans and one American.


