Secours Nationale Makes Appeal for Destitute People Without Shelter.

WARM GARMENTS ALSO

Portable Houses May Be Forwarded if Arrangements Can Be Made.

That the war and its devastating onsequences are still living, vital issues, is brought very closely home to anyone who visits the Secours National at 51 West King street, the headquarters for French relief in On-

tario.

"There is a falling off in endeavor," said Mrs. Sidney Small, one of the most steadfast workers that the call of patriotism has produced, "a falling off for which it is hard to account. Yet the war continues and needs are as great as ever. There are thousands of French refugees utterly destitute in the isolated parts of northern France and it is for them we want blankets and warm clothes as the sand blankets and warm clothes as the sea-

"Why, only think of it," Mrs Small continued, becoming more and more earnest as the need grew greater before her mental vision, "In one village alone in France 600 children were left roaming helplessly about without father or mother, after an onslaught by the enemy."

"What we want particularly are blankets—blankets, blankets, blankets! The need becomes greater every day We also want warm garments and boots for men, women and children. Foodstuffs, too, are another

need.
"We are also thinking of sending houses, because in many areas there is no such thing as a dwelling left.
