carried only the Appearance, not the Reality of a lasting Peace: for Philip's Conduct was enough to convince every one, that his Intentions were no farther pacifick, than fuited with his Convenience. Yet ever fertile in Expedients, his Orators perfuaded the Athenians that he meant fincerely, while his Actions infringed every Article of the Treaty he had fo lately fworn to. Such is Gallic Faith, and fo far it may be relied on in Matters of Confequence; for if we judge of Hiftory, by comparing one with another, we may find the Treaties with France (I will not particularize any) violated as foon as formed, and fee another Philip in the Heart of every Frenchman.

BUT to proceed to our Narrative: This laft Truce, which may be filled a barrier Treaty, was broke through as foon as concluded on; *Philip* taking Advantage of the Security of *Athens* broke through the Limits, and ravaging the Allies deftroyed their Towns, difmantled their Citadels, all out of Goodwill to the *Athenians*, and the Safety of *Greece* in general.

LET every Englishman, when he peruses these Lines, re-confider the Policy of Philip not as a mere Event which happened above C 2 Two
