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is very doubtful. Teeth which have been drawn by mistake, do not always become firm, when replaced in the jaw; how much less should we expect a tooth belonging to another person to become firm, when crowded into a socket of unsuitable dimensions. The uncertainty of success is a strong argument against transplanting; besides, we must pay dear for the experiment, and procure several persons to have teeth extracted from corresponding parts of their jaws, until we can get one that will fit; or, the transplanted tooth must be cut and filed very much, to make it answer at all. When we have succeeded in fixing it tolerably well in the jaw, it is tied as we wish it
