

PREFACE.

IN taking up the plan proposed by Mr. ULLACKE,
it will be necessary, as the present is an effort in
some degree of a novel character, to make a few
remarks upon the execution of the work: and I
entreat the liberal consideration of the profession
to the difficulty of the undertaking, which required
to an eminent degree, the talent of accurate
definition, and scientific arrangement.

I have in every respect, endeavoured strictly to
pursue the plan proposed to me. In the first
place, by adopting with the greatest exactness the
arrangement of Domat; for although English
lawyers have never, since the days of Fortesque,
felt any peculiar veneration for the codes of the
Civil Law, but have entertained an honest, and
perhaps laudable, prejudice to their disadvantage;
yet certainly there can be no reason, why this pre-
judice should prevent us from adopting their clear
and perspicuous style of arrangement. And should
it be necessary, as I think it hardly is, in this
enlightened age, to bring forward authorities, in
