

## FOUND POISON IN BODIES OF TWO OF THE VICTIMS

Coroner Disposed to Exhume at  
Least Three More—Mrs. Ver-  
mylia Has Heart Disease.

CHICAGO, Nov. 10.—Poison found in the viscera of two more of the ten persons who have died mysteriously beneath the roof of Mrs. Louise Vermilya, made more tangible to-day the suspicions and accusations made against the woman. At the county jail hospital, where she lies ill from attempts to take her own life, she was not informed of the new evidence the police will bring to bear in charging her with murder.

Toxicologist Walter L. Haines to-day communicated his report to the coroner's office. The finding was that arsenic was present in large quantities in the viscera of Conductor Richard T. Smith and of Frank Brinkamp, the latter being Mrs. Vermilya's son.

These bodies were exhumed after poison had been found in the remains of Policeman Arthur Bissonette, the last of the ten to die, when relatives and friends told the coroner the circumstances of the deaths were similar to those of Bissonette.

In the case of Frank Brinkamp, Mrs. Vermilya's favorite son, the fiancée of the boy induced an investigation of the possibility of his having partaken of the "pepper box" poison. The coroner announced he would ask the state's attorney to request an indictment charging Mrs. Vermilya of having criminal knowledge of the deaths of Brinkamp and Smith.

Coroner Hoffman said he was disposed to "open still more graves of those whose deaths had occurred beneath Mrs. Vermilya's roof. There were at least three others whose deaths were, he said, recent enough for poison to be apparent, if they had so died. Whether he would go into those cases, he said, depended upon the advice of the state's attorney.

Mrs. Vermilya was near death during the day. She is suffering from valvular heart disease.

## INVESTIGATION GOES ON

No Truth in Statement That Borden  
Government Has Intervened.

OTTAWA, Nov. 10.—(Special).—The report sent out from Montreal and widely quoted in some Canadian and United States newspapers to the effect that the Borden government had held up the investigation of the alleged monopoly of the United Shoe Machinery Co. is officially contradicted by the department of labor.

The falsity of the statement is abundantly proven by correspondence on the file of the department. The fact is that Hon. T. W. Crothers, after a personal investigation into the equity and merits of the inquiry, instructed Judge Ingham, chairman of the board, to proceed at once with the investigation. The department is represented by counsel, and intends to prosecute the inquiry to its finish.

## NAME SCHOOL AFTER DUKE

His Royal Highness Will Turn First  
Sod on Morley-Avenue.

Another letter received by the board of education yesterday from Major Stanley, aide-de-camp to Lieut.-Gov. Gibson, stated that the Duke of Connaught would visit a number of the schools of Toronto on Thursday, Nov. 30, from 10.30 to 12.30.

Arrangements by the inspectors and the chairman of each of the committees of the board are being made for His Royal Highness to turn the first sod on the site for the new building to be erected on the recently purchased Morley-avenue city after which the Duke of Connaught.

During his visit the duke will also review the school children and be greeted by the high school cadets, 3000 strong.

Back to the Jail.  
John Copeland, who was one of the minor figures in the septet of jail-breakers who escaped from the house of alleged detention about three years ago, and who was arrested in Hamilton a few days ago, was sent back to the jail, which he left without stopping to say good-bye. He will remain there 60 days this time should the place prove escape proof.

Broke Game Laws.  
BRANTFORD, Nov. 10.—(Special).—Heavy fines were inflicted in police court here to-day when Chester Tapley and John Stewart were found guilty of a breach of the game laws. Tapley was fined \$30 for having secured \$33 in his possession and Stewart \$33 for killing muskrats. Both pleaded ignorance of the law.

## TWO MILLIONS NEEDED FOR NEW CITY SCHOOLS

Superintendent Bishop Wants  
\$600,000 Provided at Once—  
Present Buildings Crowded.

Six hundred thousand dollars is the interim appropriation which is asked for at once by Building Superintendent Bishop of the Toronto schools, and in order to meet the increased attendance of pupils, another appropriation will be asked for at the first of the year of \$1,400,000 for the schools.

In a report to the property committee yesterday the superintendent called attention to the large number of temporary class rooms now in use, some being located in basements and some building scattered over the length and breadth of the city.

New Buildings Available.  
The buildings provided in this year's estimates are already becoming available and will all be occupied by next Easter, with the exception of a pair of Manning-avenue and another smaller one, for which there has been no secured. The report warns the committee that if a delay next year is experienced in getting money from the city council, such as occurred this year, there will be a continuance of the unsatisfactory conditions—the overcrowded schools.

Object to Medical Report.  
The medical health report, in which deputy inspector reported bad conditions in some of the schools, did not please some of the trustees, especially Trustees Brown and Leves. Trustee Nobil thought it was the proper thing for them to report, otherwise what were they for? he asked. The committee instructed Supt. Bishop to report to them at once for the defective children.

Robert Abernethy was appointed caretaker, to take the place of Duncan Ritchie, resigned, at Shirley-st. school.

## HUSBAND WAS ELUSIVE

But Thomas Henderson Now Promises  
to Provide for Wife.

The courts at Glasgow ordered Thomas Henderson to make a weekly remittance to his wife, which he did at a time in August, 1910, this ceased, and for a time Mrs. Henderson was figuratively at sea. Finally she located Henderson in Canada, and when she arrived here she found that she had once more lost him.

The other day she found him in Toronto. Then she told him she was going to work in Barrie. Thursday officer. He told the magistrate in police court yesterday that he had come to Canada to better himself and had done so to such an extent that he is now prepared to keep his wife and a week's remand to allow him to make good.
