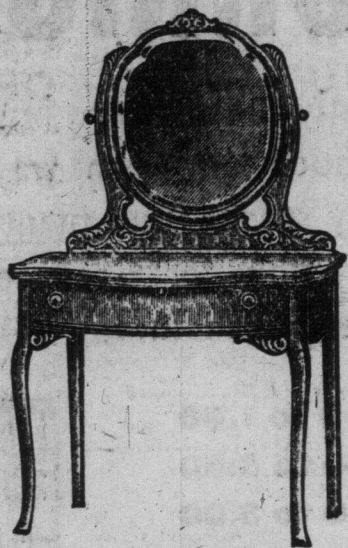

London, Dec. 20.—The foreign office today said that no statement could be made at present relative to the appointment of James Bryce as ambassador to the United States in succession to Sir Mortimer Durand, but it is generally understood that the usual formalities are now going on, preliminary to an early official announcement of the appointment.

Winnipeg, Dec. 20.—The Hebrew residents of Winnipeg have remitted to their old homes in Europe during the past year the sum of \$500,000. Three thousand dollars in cash has been sent by the Chinamen of Winnipeg to the Orient during the past six days.

NO INJUNCTION YET.

And Probabilities Are That None Will Be Issued.

Mayor Coatsworth is now of opinion that no injunction is likely to be served on the city to prevent the power bylaw being submitted. The city solicitor has, as yet, received no notice, and the mayor believes that the injunction would have been served yesterday if it was to have been served at all, as every day nearer polling-day lessens the probability of success in any such action.

"It would cause all the electric companies an immense amount of harm," was the mayor's comment. "Those who might take such action would be no friends of the men who have brought power here at such enormous expense. It would do the companies a great injury in the public estimation."

The mayor added that any legal steps to prevent the bylaw becoming effective could be taken just as well after its passing as before.

"I must say in justice to the Electrical Development Company, that, so far as I know, the suggestion of proceedings did not emanate from them."

Owing to illness in the family, Chairman Ald. Chisholm of the civic island committee was absent from the meeting called for yesterday afternoon. Other absentees were Ald. McMurich, Hay and McGhie, and a quorum was lacking.

He says that it cost the city \$1213 for five months for an average of thirty-eight lights produced from the city electric light plant at Island Park, and burning till midnight, while under contract an all-night service giving 25 per cent. more light could be furnished for \$104 for the same number of lights. A gas service is objectionable, chiefly because of the difficulty in keeping the lights clear of insects.

Waiting Time.
The city architect is desirous that the board of trade and other public bodies wrestling with the new building bylaw should report upon it without loss of time. He declares belief that the bylaw is none too stringent.

The city solicitor yesterday issued a writ for unstated damages against the street railway for injury done to water mains by the "negligent generating and use of electrical current."

Ottawa Printers Ask More.
Ottawa, Dec. 20.—A delegation from the linotype operators of the Government Printing Bureau waited on the secretary of state to-day and asked for an increase in the wages paid. The arrangement in 1903 was to give what was paid in Toronto and Montreal.

The linotype men say that they are only getting the minimum, and want the average rate. Mr. Scott asked them to appoint a committee.

DONKEYS ILL-TREATED.

Ex-Ald. Davies Alleged to Be Responsible for Inhumane Conditions.

After hearing the testimony of several witnesses as to ill-treatment and neglect of several donkeys at Balm Beach, the Toronto Humane Society yesterday decided to proceed against ex-Ald. Davies in the county court.

A constable stated that there were eight donkeys, which were used in the summer for children to ride on. They had been turned loose without food or shelter and allowed to roam around, subject to abuse. A resident at Balm Beach said that one animal had been frozen to death, another had been injured by a street car, and one was missing. The five left were fed by people who had sympathy for the beasts.

A letter from Goldwin Smith urged the society to use its influence to have the elephant at the Zoo transferred to High Park, where it should be allowed freedom, either in an enclosure or at large. The society will send a deputation to the park commissioner.
