Gives Notice of a Bill to Establish Eight Hours as a Working Day Throughout Canada,

Ottawa, April 21.-(Special.)-Major Beat tle has given notice of his intention to introduce in the House a bill to establish eight hours as a working day throughout Canada. The bill is entitled "An Act to determine the length of a working day for workmen and laborers," and provides : "That eight hours shall be the length of the working day for all workmen and laborers employed, either permanently or temporarily, by any person, or by any contractor or sub-contractor under ""That even the sub-contractor under

him. "That every such person, contractor or sub-contractor who has under him, or who employs, workmen or laborers, and who wilfully vlotates the provisions of this Act, is guilty of an indictable offence and liable to a penalty not ex-ceeding one thousand dollars or to im-prisonment for a term not exceeding six months, or to both penalty and impris-onment, in the discretion of the court."




