INVESTORS PERTURBED STOCKS SLUMP AGAIN

ndustrials Raided at N.Y. and Prices Respond-Some Comparisons With Past Figures.

Another slump in New York stocks was witnessed in yesterday's markets, and the Toronto traders are nonplussed at the apparently interminable liquidation forced in this market. Last December The World called attention to the change that was being effected in interest return on stable securities, owing to the increased demand for money necessitated by the inflation, natural or otherwise, of every other commodity. Such a change has gone into effect, and there is as yet little evidence that sufficient reduction has been made to meet the wants of investors who, as a basic consideration, form a bottom for stock values.

Another consideration has lately arisen, and that is the position of industrial securities regarding their loanable nature in financial institutions. So long as the public was prepared to provide funds for the carrying of these securities, together with collateral of unquestionable character, such as railroads, so long were the banks secure in their position as loaners. The immense liquidation of all classes of stocks has, however, left the banks with only the insiders to deal with, and there is a perturbed feeling among finstocks has, however, left the banks with only the insiders to deal with, and there is a perturbed feeling among financial institutions that the position is none too safe. Under such a state of affairs, it is not remarkable that the industrial stocks at New York suffered at the hands of the bears yesterday.

The insiders of these supposed securities have already all the stock they can reasonably handle, and when blocks are thrown at them by short sellers it should be no matter of wonder that prices fade away at the offerings. Amalgamated Copper was the feature of yesterday's trading at New York, and the price dropped six points during the pressure of the day. When the public was market crazy, the stock sold at nearly 100 points above its present price, and was difficult of purchase, even at a fractional decline. The change in price is only evidence of the change in sentiment, and may be taken as an indication of public feeling in other directions. Fall of Copper.

Toronto is thought to be holding fully 10,000 shares of the stock yet, some of which is fully paid up.


