

One-Third More Will Be Asked From London Conference.

FAVOR EQUAL RIGHTS Resolution To Be Presented From District Pastors and Laymen.

Ministers and laymen who attended the May meeting of the London Methodist district are in favor of equal privileges for men and women in the church. This view was expressed in a resolution to go up to the General Conference, which passed without a dissenting voice at the final session yesterday afternoon in the Wellington Street Methodist Church.

The resolution was to this effect: "In view of the fact that Christian democracy is gaining in acceptance with people in matters of state, resolved, that the General Conference be memorialized to recognize the principle of Christian democracy within the church, and grant to women in every way equality with men in matters that pertain to the church."

Urge Salary Increase.

Another resolution brought in of reach importance was to the effect

Another resolution brought in of much importance was to the effect that the General Conference be requested to increase the minimum salary of ordained ministers of the church one-third. Further memorials to be sent up to the General Conference from the London district through the London annual conference ask for closer cooperation between the various departments of the church, educational, Sunday school, missionary, etc.; for reorganization of the Sunday school and Young People's Society board, to make it a religious education department, and to increase the grant to superannuated ministers.

Money Is Needed.

Rev. Dr. F. L. Barber explained and made an appeal on behalf of the fund for increasing the endowment of Victoria College. Increase is necessary for two reasons. In the first place, the college has been annually losing money on account of the increased cost of heating, owing to centralization of university work, and in the second place, \$10,000 is being lost in students' fees on account of the decrease of men students, because of the number of enlistments.
