NEWS

SUPPLY HOLDS OUT WELL.—London's water supply is still holding out, despite the long dry spell of weather according to E. V. Buchanan, general manager of the utilities commission.

SIGNALLY HONORED BY PEOPLE
OF DIOCESE ON 25TH ANNIVERSARY

BISHOP M. F. FALLON.

BISHOP FALLON GIVEN PURSE
OF \$7,000 FOR HIMSELF AND
\$170,000 FOR SEMINARY ON
OCCASION OF HIS ANNIVERSARY

Has Completed 25 Years in Priesthood—Prelate Will Transfer Personal Gift to Endowment Fund—Priests Are Invested As Domestic Prelates.

On the occasion of the 25th anniversary of the Right Reverend Bishop M. F. Fallon to the priesthood, St. Peter's Cathedral, festive with white flowers and purple and white trimmings, was packed for the two-hour service held this morning.

During the service, a personal gift of \$7,000 was presented to the bishop from the priests of the Diocese of London, and the magnificent sum of \$170,000, an endowment for the new seminary, was also presented to the bishop from the parishioners of the Diocese of London, Stratford and Windsor.

All Goes to Seminary. The bishop's office overcame with the generosity of the priests and parishioners of the diocese, saying that no bishop in North America had ever received such a substantial sum of money. Though the \$7,000 from the priests of the Diocese of London, and the \$170,000 from the parishioners of the Diocese of London, Stratford and Windsor, the bishop announced in his address to the priests that he would use it in the erection of the new seminary.

The bishop was made by Rev. Father J. D. Downing, dean of Windsor, and the address from the parishioners of the Diocese of London, Stratford and Windsor, was read by Rev. Father J. T. The bishop's address was the celebrant of the mass, assisted by Rev. Dean Downing of Stratford. The deacons of the Diocese of London, Stratford and Windsor, were Rev. Fathers J. J. Gnam of Ingersoll and D. Forster of St. Martin's church.

A luncheon was held in the bishop's hall at the Tecumseh at 1:30 o'clock.

GOVERNMENT SHOULD KEEP ITS
HANDS OFF FIXING OF PRICES, IS
THE OPINION OF S. F. GLASS, M. P.

Declares Producers Here Have Suffered Whenever Powers That Be Have Interfered With This Problem.

As far as the fixing of minimum and maximum prices is concerned, the Dominion Government should keep its hands off the markets, in the opinion of S. F. Glass, M. P. As an example of what had been done by this interference, he pointed to the situation regarding the export of cheese. CRIMINAL INVESTIGATOR
OF DETROIT, OLD LONDON
BOY, VISITING OLD HOME

David Baker Discusses Work Across Border—Watching for Race Troubles.

David Baker, criminal investigator of Detroit, a London Old Boy, was in this city today, owing to the serious illness of his father, Alfred Baker, who is receiving treatment in Victoria Hospital. The visitor was at the police station this morning renewing acquaintanceship with local detectives, and he returned to Detroit today.

Mr. Baker is one of eight criminal investigators of Wayne County with headquarters in Detroit, and a population of one million and a half people to protect. The detectives of Wayne County are directly under the jurisdiction of these experts, there being a force of 82 men in the City of Detroit, and a population of over 800,000 motor cars per month are stolen in Detroit alone, 70 per cent of which are recovered by the police.

Mr. Baker informed a reporter that no race riots had as yet broken out in the City of Detroit, but with a negro population of 80,000, the police were ordered to be on the alert for the appearance of such outbreaks. Every effort is being exerted by them to pre-

vent an occurrence of this kind. He stated that last week the first arrest by aeroplane in the annals of the world had been made at Warren Field, Detroit, when two constables, in a plane, swooped down on a speeder, and landing in the road effected the arrest. The father of this distinguished London Old Boy was reported today to be improved in condition, and owing to his pressing duties across the border, investigator Baker left for Detroit today.

WITH MOTOR THEFT;
REMAINED A WEEKAccused of Taking Car From
Glencoe Garage.CAUGHT BY DETECTIVES
It Is Alleged They Burned One
Car and Stole Another.

Charles Coffin, aged 22 years, and his brother, Albert Coffin, aged 19, arrested late last night by Sergeant of Detectives Thomas Nickle and Detective Harry Down on a charge of a motor car theft, appeared before Capt. T. E. Robson, deputy county magistrate, at the county court this morning, and were remanded for one week.

Charles was arrested at Mount Brydges and Albert was taken in tow at 730 Hamilton road, following investigation by the local police of the theft of a Chevrolet car from the garage of J. Dobie, near Glencoe recently.

In place of the stolen car a wrecked auto of similar make was left beside the road, with the body and wheels burned. Charles was arrested with what the police say is the stolen car in his possession. It had been repainted the dark color to a gaudy yellow, and the aerial wheels having been transformed in number painted black.

In addition to the above alterations, the engine number had been changed, and the car, which had been stored in a garage at Mount Brydges. These facts being learned, warrants were issued for the arrest of the above men, and the local detectives served them.

The number on the stolen car was 4871, but this was replaced by markings of the burned car, which the prisoners state was their own property. However, the local police are of the opinion that it also is a stolen car, and its license number is 4872, a 1916 Chevrolet model.

Neither of the accused brothers was asked to plead nor was any evidence in the case taken at the county court this morning.

The register of the car in which the detectives arrested the elder Coffin showed that since it had been missed it had been driven over 500 miles.

The Celebration

Marriage Policy of
Insurance Is the
Plan in BritainDesigned To Meet Needs of
Those Recently Wedded
or About To Marry.

London, July 29.—Life assurance discussions are likely to be enlivened for some little time to come by the issue of what is termed a marriage policy. This novel scheme is the work of actuaries of Dominion's insurance companies, and is designed to meet the needs of the recently married men and those about to marry.

It provides for payment of \$2,500 at the expiration of 25 years or earlier at the death of the assured, and in addition \$500 for each of five children born after the date of the policy, who attain the age of 12 years, payable by five installments of \$100 each on the 12th, 24th, 36th, 48th and 60th birthdays, and four succeeding birthdays.

Should any child die between the ages of 12 and 25 years, the outstanding installments would still be payable on the anniversaries of the birthday until the full \$500 had been paid. Similarly, if any of the five children died before reaching the age of 12, the five installments would still be payable on the 12th and four subsequent anniversaries of the birthday of the child.
