NC-4 Makes Flight Over Ocean From Trepassy Bay, Newfoundland, To Port of Horta in 15 Hours and

13 Minutes.

Ponta Delgada, Azores, May 17.—The seaplane NC-4 arrived at the port of Horta, in the Azores, at 1:25 p.m. Greenwich time, or 9:20 a.m. Washington time, which would make the time of the flight 15 hours and 13 minutes from Trepassy Bay. The distance between the two points covered is 1,352 miles.


