**FATHER VAUGHAN'S ADDRESS**

Mansey Hall Crowded to Hear Famous Western Divine.

Mansey Hall was crowded to capacity Sunday afternoon when Rev. Father Vaughan of Madison, Wisconsin, a gifted orator, gave an address on "The Power of Love," under the auspices of the Canadian Temperance League.

Love, he said, was the chief stone of every religion that had influenced the world. The twelve Apostles who went forth at the call of the Master were imbued with the one spirit—love for the Master and love for their fellowmen. If we would touch our fellow men, socially, physically or morally, it must be by following in the footsteps of the Master.

Father Vaughan was plain spoken in his criticism of the easygoing church of the present day. He had little use for the man or woman who simply sits in his or her comfortably cushioned pew and does not get out among the great suffering and sinning masses of the people, and bring Christ to them. With pointed eloquence and force he asked, "Is yours the kind of religion that clothes the naked child because that child is a brother of Christ? Do your cultured women sit at home out of their beautiful churches and do nothing for the suffering poor? On the question of temperance there was no mistaking his attitude. It had come his way to make a careful study of the cause of the degenerate—those poor creatures who fill our asylums. Out of one hundred and sixty cases that had come directly under the speaker's notice, and whose names he had traced, there was not one where either the father or the mother had been users of whiskey.

The league's pledge-taking meeting for young men was held at 8 p.m. in the Griffin Theatre. Jos. T. de Riemer an earnest address.

**BLAMES STRIKE ON WALL ST.**

Assessment Upon Members of Western Federation.

DENVER, Col., Dec. 7.—At a meeting of the executive committee of the Western Federation of Miners in this city, it was agreed to levy an assessment upon members of the union for the cost of the strike. The possibility of securing a congressional investigation of President Roosevelt's action in sending troops to Goldfield, the request of Governor Snyder of Nevada was discussed, and it was practically decided to bring the matter to the attention of congress.

The action of the president in sending troops to Goldfield was the result of a pre-arranged conspiracy between Wall-street interests and Governor Sparks," declared Acting President Mahoney after the executive session. "There was absolutely no need for such action."

William D. Haywood, secretary, declared that the mine owners were themselves responsible for the strike, and any trouble that followed must be laid to their doors. He said that the owners had violated their agreement and ignored a compromise to which they had agreed.

**BASE SUNFIELD APPEAL ON EVIDENCE THAT'S NEW**

If Unsuccessful Convicted Murderer Will Hang on Dec. 27—General News of City.

HAMILTON, Dec. 8.—(Special.)—J. L. Counsel, Jake Sunfield's lawyer, says he has new evidence upon which to base his appeal to the minister of justice. He says he can produce witnesses who will refute the evidence of W. Walsh, who claimed that Radzyk told him that Sunfield had done the shooting. Now that the court of appeal has confirmed the sentence, Dec. 27, will be the date of the execution unless Mr. Counsel is successful in his appeal to Ottawa.

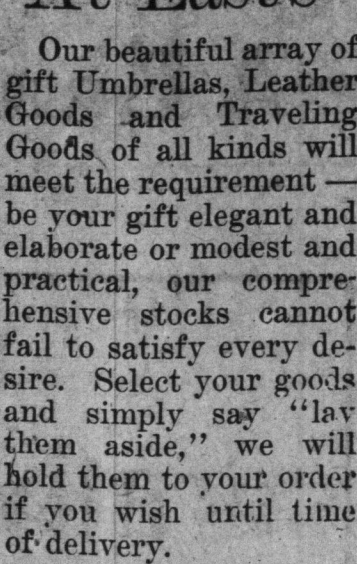

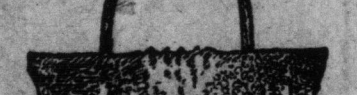

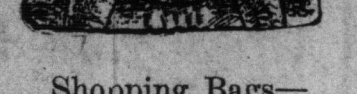
