Freddy Welsh Awarded the Decision Charley White Lasted 20 Rounds

Chicago Challenger Repeatedly Clinched—Welsh Did the Leading Thruout—White's Friends Chased Referee After the Bout—The Story by Rounds.

COLORADO SPRINGS, Col., Sept. 16.—Freddie Welsh retained his title of champion of the world by knocking out today after going twenty rounds with Charlie White of Chicago, Referee Billy Carson presiding, at the Elks club. The decision on points.
