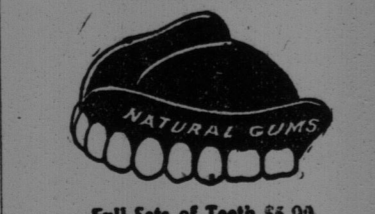

A. D. Case and W. Carpenter of Wickham arrived in the city today and report the roads in good condition for sleighing. Mrs. J. E. Cowan, Jr. (nee McConnell) will receive at her home, Douglas Avenue, on Wednesday and Thursday afternoon and evening of this week.

Norwegian bark Staut, Captain Thorsen, cleared today for the long voyage to Rosario, with a cargo of spruce lumber, shipped by A. Cushing & Co.

No. 4 engine house have their flag flying in the little triangular space opposite in honor of the boys of the Valley Athletic Club who made such a fine showing in Montreal.

Manifests for 110 cars of United States products were received at the customs house today from frontier ports of Canada for shipment to the United Kingdom in winter port steamers.

The funeral of Harry Lovitt was held this afternoon at 3:15 from Fitzpatrick's undertaking rooms. Service was conducted by Rev. G. A. Kuhring, and interment was made in Fernhill.

Nixon and Oliv, returned home last night from Houlton, Maine, where they took part in a roller race getting fourth position. The boys were treated well by the manager of the rink and the people of Houlton. The rink there is very small.

C. P. R. steamship Montrose, now on her way to London and Antwerp from this port, took away a cargo valued at \$140,000. Total \$384,880. Among her cargo were 88,249 bushels of wheat, 28,023 bushels barley, and 733 head of cattle.

The preliminary trial of Hutton and Baird, the two Fairview men charged with stealing here from Harry Galley, was finished yesterday afternoon and Justice Mason sent both men up for trial. The case has attracted considerable interest and was drawn out to considerable length. County Secretary Vincent prosecuted and J. A. Barry appeared for the men.

It is now learned that the presence in these provinces of Jimmy Williams, the speedy little hockey player, who lined up with Fredericton against Moncton, was to take a position with the Nova Scotia Steel company at New Glasgow. Whether or not he will figure on the line-up of the New Glasgow team in the Nova Scotia Hockey League remains to be seen.

R. shed on Saturday evening, when Andrew Leach, for twenty-three years in the government service at the wharf, was presented a handsome set of briar pipes and a caddy of English tobacco. Mr. Leach is popular with the employees and has earned the record of a faithful and trusted employee. The presentation was made by Mr. Matthewson, clerk in the Furness line office, and Mr. Leach replied suitably. He has been superannuated and will leave in a few days to visit his daughter in Wisconsin.
