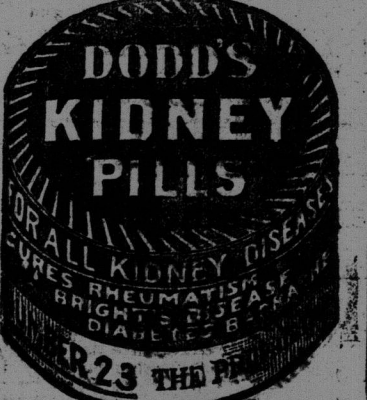
RECENT DEATHS

GREAT LOT OF WHEAT BOUGHT BY GOVERNMENT

From 12,000,000 to 15,000,000 Bushels For British Government—Matter of Great Importance

Ottawa, Nov. 28.—On the receipt of a large order for Canadian wheat from the British government for the use of the imperial troops, the government here suddenly took action yesterday to commandeer all the wheat of grades No. 1, 2 and 4 northern, at present in store in the elevators at the head of the lakes and eastward.

The total amount thus commandeered is estimated at from 12,000,000 to 15,000,000 bushels. In other words, the government has decided to appropriate a fair market price, to be fixed later, for the quantity of wheat in order to fill the British government's order.

The wheat thus commandeered does not include grain in western elevators, or in the farmers' hands, or grain in transit at the time the order was passed, and the usual grain business, as it affects selling, will not be interfered with except in so far as the wheat now in the eastern terminals is affected.

In a statement issued tonight, the government makes it clear that the exportation is limited merely to the grain above mentioned, and the secrecy with which the order was promulgated was designed to obviate under speculation on the grain exchange, which might have occurred through open buying before all the conditions were known.

Some weeks ago, when the militia department here decided to furnish its own supply of Canadian flour to the Canadian troops in England, it was found that the price charged to the war office for that supply dropped about 40 per cent. The saving thus effected by Canada in the cost of feeding the troops was notified by the war office. It is believed that a similar saving can be made in the supply for the British troops by similar action in the government purchase of Canadian wheat and flour for army use.

There is no telling where the first order may lead to. It may mean the commandeering of many more millions of Canada's exportable surplus, to say nothing of the advertising of the grain given to the Canadian wheat crop, which will undoubtedly be permanent in its effects.

In anticipation of heavy shipments of grain throughout the winter, the government's move in the past, but it is such orders as have just been placed are to be repeated a great deal of wheat must, of necessity, be in way to Halifax or St. John, via all rail during the coming winter. The all-rail rate at present is in the neighborhood of 18 cents from Winnipeg to Quebec, as against 18 cents rail and lake. The government has been urged to put into effect on the National Transcontinental a freight rate, but has so far not committed itself. The other railway companies have been asked to quote a minimum rate by rail, but none has yet been decided upon.

MAKING A MILLION CHRISTMAS PUDDINGS. Soldiers at the Front May Receive 2,000,000, Judging by Way the Public is Subscribing—Movies Record Event

London, Nov. 28.—One million Christmas puddings are being turned out by one of London's biggest wholesale bakeries for the soldiers at the front. The big shop has been at it for a week and already 25,000 of the plum puddings have been made, packed and sent away. It may be when things get running faster and harder to buy puddings so that the soldiers will be getting two millions.

Money for the "pudding" is being put into one of the Christmas funds. It comes in big and small lots, from everywhere. One portion of plum pudding—that is 2 pounds of it—costs twelve cents, so that every sixpence donation means just that much pudding for a soldier.

The bakeries that have undertaken to produce the million, or perhaps two million puddings, has set a staff of 100 men and women at work. The management of the shop says it is the largest pudding contest ever undertaken in history.

To let the world know something about this pudding project, moving pictures have been taken of each stage of the work involved in it. These are to be shown upon screens in Great Britain, the United States, Russia, France, Canada, and in fact almost everywhere but in the domain of the Kaiser and his ally, the Emperor of Austria-Hungary.

The puddings are being made in lots of a quarter of a ton at a time. The ingredients which are heaped on an immense table in the middle of the spacious shop, comprise 100 pounds of raisins, 50 pounds of currants, 50 pounds of sultanas, 10 quarts of milk, ten quarts of eggs, to say nothing of spices.

The fire has caught the workers in white aprons and caps first spreading the ingredients from the bags on the table. When kneaded the mixture is put into eight pound tins, and these are sold by white-robed workmen. Next comes the steaming process in huge retorts. The puddings are boiled for five hours then whisked to the crating room and shipped off.

Each tin is supposed to supply Christmas pudding for four soldiers. One million puddings will cost \$150,000.

Delivery of scrip certificates paid of bonds will be made through the chartered banks.

The interest on the fully registered bonds will be paid by cheque, which will be remitted by post. Interest on bonds with coupons will be paid on surrender of coupons. Both cheques and coupons will be payable free of charge at any branch of any chartered bank in Canada.

Holders of fully registered bonds without coupons will have the right to convert into bonds with coupons payable to bearer or registered, without payment of any fee, and holders of bonds with coupons will have the right to convert, without fee, into fully registered bonds without coupons at any time on application in writing to the Minister of Finance.

The issue will be exempt from taxes—including any income tax—imposed in succession of inheritance levied by the Parliament of Canada.

The bonds with coupons will be issued in denominations of \$100, \$500, \$1,000. Fully registered bonds without coupons will be issued in denominations of \$1,000, \$5,000 or any authorized multiple of \$5,000.

Application will be made in due course for the listing of the issue on the Montreal and Toronto Stock Exchanges.

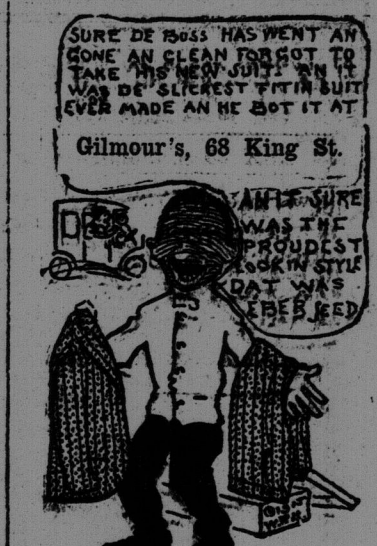
The loan will be repaid at maturity at par at the office of the Minister of Finance and Receiver General at Ottawa, or at the office of the Assistant Receiver General at Halifax, St. John, Charlottetown, Montreal, Toronto, Winnipeg, Regina, Calgary or Victoria.

The books of the loan will be kept at the Department of Finance, Ottawa.

Recognized bond and stock brokers will be allowed a commission of one-quarter of one per cent on allotments made in respect of applications which bear their stamp.
