London, May 30, 9 p.m.—The new coalition government has been completed by the appointment of under secretaries of state. Those who have been chosen for these positions are:

Parliamentary under secretary, home affairs, William Bruce, a Laborite, who is president of the South Wales Miners' Federation; foreign affairs, Lord Robert Cecil; colonies, Arthur H. D. R. Steel; maltland, Conservative member of par-

liament for East Birmingham; India, Baron Ingham, former secretary of state for the colonies; war, Harold J. Tennant.

The financial secretaries appointed are: War, Henry William Foster; admiralty, the Right Hon. Thomas J. MacNair.

The new parliamentary secretaries will be: Board of Trade, Ernest J. Prentiss; man, local government board, Right Hon. William Hayes Fisher; agriculture, Sir Charles T. D. Ackland; board of education, Right Hon. John Herbert Lewis; munitions, Christopher Addison.

MONCTON MEN
ARE WOUNDEDLetter of Interest From Lieut.
Frank Tingley

HE WAS HIT IN LEG

Tells of Stirring Scenes in Great
Battle and Relates Something
of Life on the Fighting Line

Lieutenant Frank Tingley writes to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Tingley of Moncton.

"Weymouth House
London, Eng., May 18.

"Dear mother and father—

"In London again, and I am getting

along nicely. I am sitting up for a while

this afternoon, to see if I will be able

to take a taxi trip for another X-ray ex-

amination to-morrow. My leg is on a

straight splint now and at times it is

a little painful, but I am getting quite

used to it, and lose very little sleep.

"I will try to explain our movements

in France to you, but it will be diffi-

cult as my maps were all left in my

saddle wallets in France."

The writer then continues:

"At last we got word that the British

were to relieve the French in the salient

round Ypres, the artillery to relieve by

half batteries at a time, so Major Ander-

son found himself for one day in com-

mand of two British 18-pounders and

two French 75's. When this relief was

half completed the Germans started a

furious attack on the British on the

left of the salient, using their famous

gas to open the ball. The Germans im-

mediately gave ground, allowing the Ger-

man infantry to come in within 800

yards of our artillery. I was at the for-

ward observing station at the time and

got a telephone message to rejoin the

battery at once. The battery was or-

dered to retire about one and one half

miles to Welzelle and take up a position

to cover the retreat. In order to do this

we had to go down the rest of the

salient under heavy rifle fire.

"It was here that George McDougall

was killed, but I was left in position

and turned into the road. We stayed

in the position at Welzelle until 8 a. m.

and then were ordered back to our or-

iginal position. The enemy's infantry

had been driven back, but the artillery

kept up a furious bombardment of the

road evidently trying to block it with

dead horses and in some places they

must have almost succeeded.

"Up to this time the Canadian in-

fantry had not come up, but now they

were thrown in to stop the rest of the

German infantry and they did fine work,

but they must have paid dearly for it,

as they came back through our position

in all sorts of conditions and most of

them nearly dead with gas, but they

had done what they had to do and had

sides dug themselves in, the Germans

having gained considerable ground and

the town of St. Julien.

"The battery was again ordered to

drop back to a position one mile in

front of Ypres. In this position we

were subject to artillery fire from all

quarters excepting in a direct line with

Ypres. The shells from the front, more

to be dreaded than those from the

front, as the range from this quarter

seemed shorter and it was from this

quarter that we got most of our casual-

went. The gas fumes were pretty bad,
but up until the time we left, the Ger-

mans had not left their trenches.

"On arrival at the battery I found

that the orders to move into reserve had

been cancelled, presumably on account of

the German attack, and it was a

case of going to the observation sta-

tion again. This time I chose another

position more in line with the battery

and target, as the old one was too much

to a flank to see our fire well. So at 9

o'clock I went to the battery and

found one. Having decided on an old

brick house 100 yards from Welzelle we

got our wire run and everything ready

by 5 a. m. and started firing at 7 a. m.

The Germans started to shell the

road in front of our position at noon

and as the battery had stopped firing on

account of broken wire I sent Wellington

back over the wire to fix it up while Com-

mean and I got in a shot of barn behind

the house, but it wasn't good enough.

They put one through the roof, getting

me in the left knee, left hand and right

arm. Commean was hit somewhere about

the head, but I don't know exactly

where. We started out the back of the

house, across the fields and had gone

about 200 yards when they dropped an-

other one over the house, and about forty

yards behind us, but fortunately it burst

on grass.

Commean faintly but a party of stretch-

ers got him up and we went alone to a

wood in which there was a dressing sta-

tion and got patched up. My knee had

swelled up so by the time that they

insisted on putting me on a stretcher,

and taking me to the main dressing sta-

tion, where I stayed until seven p. m.

My leg was in a splint and I was

in the hospital until the following day

when they put me in a hospital train for

Boulogne. On the train the doctors had to

prevent gangrene. One of the doc-

tors, Dr. Hughes, a friend of Ned Mc-

Carthy's.

"On arrival at Boulogne, I was put in

No. 7 stationary hospital and wrote you

from there.

Summer's Thoughtfulness

May 14th—"Was interrupted in my let-

ter yesterday to have my wounds dress-

ed and had a visit from Mr. F. W.

Sumner, who is representing Mr. F. W.

Sumner, general for New Brunswick,

in London, was very kindly placed his

car to get Fred Corbet to run in and see

me in a few days. I don't expect to be

able to take advantage of the offer for

a few weeks.

"I don't think I'll ever forget the trip

in the hospital ship from Boulogne to

Dover. We stayed aboard all night in

Boulogne, sailing the next morning at

ten with 608, including forty officers who

were placed together on the main deck

forward. It being just a few days after

the disaster, a sharp lookout

was kept for submarines, and everyone

was relieved when we ran between the

white cliffs at Dover, then on to a hos-

pital train leaving Dover at six p. m. We

arrived at Charing Cross at eight to be

met by a long string of ambulances with

stretchers and nurses.

"Too much cannot be said in favor of

the Red Cross and the system they have

used to convey wounded with speed,

safety and comfort from the fighting

line to London, then to be distributed

according to the injury, to hospitals

and convalescent homes throughout

England."

ROTHESAY BOY WAS

DROWNED YESTERDAY

Wilfred Enslow, Aged Twelve,

Loses Life When he and Two

Companions Plunge Into River

From Over Turned Canoe

Thrown into the Kennebecasis river,

at Rothesay yesterday morning, when a

small canoe in which he and two other

boys were paddling, was upset, Wilfred

Enslow, aged twelve years, son of Mr.
