WELSHMAN FAILS
TO PRESS VOTE
OF CONFIDENCE

Liberals Hopeful As
Parliamentary Con-
ference Ends

UNITY FAVORED

Committee Formed to Convey
"Sense of Meeting" to the
Liberal Leader

LONDON, June 4.—There is talk in the air of a possible attempt at reconciling the differences between the Earl of Oxford and Asquith and Mr. Lloyd George, arising from the recent general strike, and correspondence between the Earl of Oxford and his followers in which Mr. Lloyd George was virtually read out of the Liberal party. The assertion is made that Mr. Lloyd George could have a vote of confidence from the Liberal parliamentary group of which he is chairman, in the controversy with the Liberal chief, but that it has been deemed better to endeavor to arrange a reconciliation with the Earl of Oxford and thus bring the party into unity and avert a possible schism.

LLOYD GEORGE JUSTIFIED

Mr. Lloyd George has justified his attitude in refusing to participate in party council when the general strike was in progress. It was at a meeting of the party's conveners that Mr. Lloyd George in a long and impassioned speech gave his reasons for not accepting the invitation of the Earl of Oxford and his supporters, who took Mr. Lloyd George to task for his refusal to be present at a "shadow cabinet" meeting and denounce the strike.

ADJOURN TO TUESDAY

A large majority of those present at yesterday's meeting of the parliamentary group are said to have supported Mr. Lloyd George and a motion of confidence was before the meeting when an adjournment was taken until next Tuesday. It is asserted that if the motion had been pressed to a vote, it would have been carried by an overwhelming majority.

Partisans of the Earl of Oxford ex-

pressed the view that it would be desirable to acquit the Earl with "the sense of the meeting," and therefore taken to hear his reply. Sir John Simon, Walter Runciman and Sir Godfrey Collins, the chief Liberal whip, were appointed to communicate the doings of the meeting to Lord Oxford. Exactly what "the sense of the meeting" implies, has not been divulged, as the participants in the meeting vowed themselves to silence. Mr. Lloyd George presided at the meeting and of the thirty-four members of the party who attended, twenty-two are believed to have been his supporters.

NO DEFEAT FOR OXFORD

While it is generally conceded that the wartime premier came out on top at the meeting, there is a virtual consensus of opinion on the part of the political correspondents of the morning newspapers, that the gathering neither was nor will be claimed as a defeat for the Earl of Oxford, and that the tenor of the meeting showed a strong desire for reconciliation between the Liberal leader and Mr. Lloyd George and restoration of unity in the party.

It was due to this manifest wish for peace, according to some of the political writers, that the motion of confidence for Mr. Lloyd George was not pressed to a vote, and that the meeting decided to communicate to Lord Oxford what was officially described as "the sense of the meeting."

MEMBERS TALK


Notwithstanding the pledge of secrecy taken by the participants in the meeting, some of the lobby correspondents seem to have learned, or at any rate profess to have learned, a good deal of what happened. Nearly all of them are emphatic on the point that a movement has been started toward reconciliation.

The Daily Mail's lobby correspondent says the message which the committee has been requested to convey to the Earl of Oxford is that the general desire of the Liberals in parliament, favors unity in the party throughout the country and a solution of the differences of its leaders through reconciliation.


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APPOINTMENTS TO
KNOX COLLEGE MADE

Rev. Thomas Eakin Named
Principal by Presbyterian
General Assembly

MONTREAL, June 4.—Rev. Thomas Eakin, Ph.D., D.D., was recommended to the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada for appointment as principal of Knox College, Toronto, in the report of the board of management, presented to the assembly today.

The board also recommended that Rev. J. D. Cunningham, D.D., be appointed to the chair of New Testament literature and exegesis, and further that no other appointments be made this year, but that the board of management be authorized to make any temporary appointments that might be found necessary. Dr. Eakin has been acting principal.

The senate report anticipated that the number of students in first year next session would be as great as any first year which Knox has had in a decade or more, and "nearly all of these are university graduates."

Locomotive Chairmen
Consider Wage Jump

CLEVELAND, Ohio, June 4.—Three hundred general chairmen of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers from all parts of the United States and Canada, meeting here to decide on an increased wage movement yesterday, appointed a sub-committee of 21 to consider the amount to be asked and report back to the full body. The sub-committee consists of three general chairmen from the eastern, western, southeastern and Canadian divisions and nine officers.

NEW MOVE FOR
PEACE IN COAL
STRIKE STARTS

Mine Owners' Chair-
man Suggests Confer-
ence With Pitmen

GOV'T APPROVES

Next Step Awaits Return of
Miners' President From
Belgium

LONDON, June 4.—Renewed effort to bring about a conference between the coal mine owners and the miners is being made. Evan Williams, chairman of the Mine Owners' Association, has taken the initiative, with approval of the government, and is sending today by aeroplane to Brussels a letter to Herbert Smith, president of the Miners' Federation, suggesting that a small committee representing the miners and mine owners shall hold a conference in an endeavor to end the strike deadlock.

Mr. Smith at present is in Brussels attending a meeting of the Miners' International Federation. Until the letter of Mr. Williams has reached him, it will be impossible to ascertain what his opinion of the suggestion is.

COOK IS PUT OUT

The new move looking toward peace is thought to have had its origin in conferences between government representatives and officials of the Mine Owners' Association during the past few days.

A. J. Cook, secretary of the Miners' Union, is not concealing the fact that his dignity was deeply wounded because the letter of Mr. Williams was not addressed to him as secretary, in-

stead of to Mr. Smith as president of the miners' organization. Cook was requested to take the letter to Brussels. No action on the situation is expected until Mr. Smith returns to England within a day or two. Meantime everything awaits on the response of the leaders to the miners to Mr. Williams.

\$2,000,000 FROM RUSSIA

"Thank God for Russia," exclaimed Mr. Cook during a speech in London in announcing that the Russian labor unions had sent nearly two million dollars to aid the striking British miners. The anti-bolshevik papers continue sharply to criticize these contributions, saying the Russian unions did not possess funds for this purpose, and that the money is really a propaganda subsidy of the Soviet government, obtained by a forced levy on the wages of poorly paid Russian workers.

HODGES PESSIMISTIC

BRUSSELS, June 4.—Confidence in the ability of the coal miners to intensify the effects of the strike in Great Britain, was expressed at the opening of an emergency meeting of the International Miners' Federation here today. The meeting was called to obtain increased support from the continental miners, both in the form of money and the prevention of coal shipments to Britain.

Secretary Frank Hodges told the correspondents he considered that no definite lasting settlement was in sight. He believed that continental embargo would be successful as the Belgian stocks were nearly exhausted and the Germans, he thought, were more interested in superseding the British coal industry in the international markets, than in helping it regain full production.
