
Meet After More Than Twenty Years

RECORD CAR RUSH AT ST. STEPHEN POINT

Officials Say Traffic Only Heavy
Into N. B. Sunday and
Monday

The American immigration officials at the border state today that never in their experiences or according to the records of their department was there such a rush of automobile traffic from the States as on Sunday and Monday—the fourth of July exodus. Hundreds upon hundreds of cars steadily streamed along the Maine traffic ways, all heading for New Brunswick, at least those with which they came in official contact. There were 122 cars from the Waltham, Mass., district alone. The officials state the big automobile procession is now fairly commenced. C. F. Foster, passenger traffic manager of the C. P. R., Montreal, who was in town today, in commenting upon summer tourist traffic, stated that the automobile is still a factor to contend with in the shorter hauls, but in the long runs the railway is still doing capacity business. In the general sense railway traffic is heavier this season than last and continually rolling back at standards.

H. B. PECK IS SUCCESSOR TO D. MACKENDRICK

Promoted From Principal
Postal Clerk in Operating
Department Here

Henry B. Peck, principal postal clerk in the operating department of the Saint John post office, whose appointment as inspector was announced by the Civil Service of Canada, was reported in The Times-Star yesterday, succeeded Dawson Mackendrick, who has been superannuated, following the customary six months' leave of absence. Mr. Peck is a native of Albert County and has been for years in the railway mail service. He is well known throughout the province and is familiar with the workings of all parts of the post office system. Last year he was transferred from the railway mail service and promoted to the post of principal clerk in the Saint John office. He is a resident of East Saint John.

So far as can be learned, the Civil Service has not yet selected a man to be bilingual inspector of post offices in the Maritime Provinces, with headquarters at Moncton. The Civil Service vice several weeks ago announced that this position, a new one, would be filled from competitive examinations, the qualifications including ability to speak and write the French language. The position left vacant by the appointment of Mr. Peck to the staff of inspectors will be filled by competitive examinations.

As she had a witness to back up her statements, the magistrate dismissed the charge, but pointed out that if the charge of assault was proved, the case would be tried again. Mrs. McKnight had a charge of fighting in the street.

YORK COUNTY HAS CREDIT BALANCE

Municipal Council Meets Today;
Jail Conditions Again
Complained of

FREDERICTON, July 6.—The July session of the Municipal Council of York County opened this afternoon, with Warden Cowperthwaite presiding. The report of Robert Carter, controller, showed a credit balance of \$15,785.73 in county accounts and a debit balance of \$2,985.78 in road accounts. One of the matters which will be considered by the Municipal Council is the claim of the City of Fredericton for \$4,700 alleged to be over-charged in county accounts, paid jointly by city and county.

The Fredericton Sub-District Board of Health is pressing again for action in regard to the Fredericton police station, alleging that conditions are unsanitary.

Objections to sale of confectionery on Sunday has been taken by some dealers in Fredericton, who have petitioned the City Council for action, saying they will be forced to remain open on Sunday if the sale continues. The police commission has been asked by the City Council to enforce the law.

WILL HAVE RIVER SAIL ON SATURDAY

Railway Men and Commercial
Travelers to Be Entertained
on Way Home

The Maritime branch of the Commercial Travelers' Association of Canada, will be officially represented at the convention in Halifax by L. M. Owens, W. J. Wetmore and George D. Ellis, of this city. Mr. Owens is the Maritime president officer. These men left at noon for the sister city.

There will be other commercial travelers from the city and from all over the three lower provinces at the gathering.

The Canadian Passenger Association and commercial travelers, holding joint convention in Halifax, number over 40,000 men. In the deliberations this week there will be 46 official representatives from the western provinces. This is the first time the big national gathering has ever been held in the Maritime Provinces. Following the convention proceedings the party will come back to Saint John via the Annapolis Valley and bay steamer.

The local travelers expect to take the visitors up river for a Saint John river salmon dinner, with strawberry shortcake. They will then depart by the evening western train.

Supt. James M. Woodman of the C. P. R., and his aides are enthusiastic in planning with the travelers and the officials in making the stay of the Western and Upper Canadian delegates as pleasant as possible as they pass through.

SHOT DEAD WHILE DRIVING HIS AUTO

Niagara Falls Man Meets Violent
Death; Machine Upset in
Ditch

NIAGARA FALLS, N. Y., July 6.—Frank Rapoport, 32, was shot and killed last night while driving his automobile. A bullet entered the back of his head and he died instantly. He was going through the windshield of his car. The machine ran a short distance and upset in a ditch. Police believe that Rapoport was alone in the car. The car was found in a ditch near the shore of the lake. The driver was turned forward to allow someone to step out.

Police were told that a man ran through a field near where the shooting occurred just after the shots were heard.
