

MILK CANS WERE TURNED INTO STILL

Two Original, Ontario, Men
May Spend Eleven Months
in Jail.

Cornwall, Dec. 13.—John Lefebvre and Xavier Laliberte, the two original men arrested last week by Inspector Edward P. Foster and Officer Frank Stuck, for operating an illicit still in a swamp a couple of miles from Avonmore, appeared before Police Magistrate Cline for trial. They were charged by Preventive Officers A. Goulet and R. Langevin, of the Inland Revenue Department, Ottawa, with having a still, the prosecution being conducted by J. G. Harkness, county crown attorney. After the submission of evidence and a certificate from the Inland Revenue Office analyst that both the spirits and "mash" samples of which were taken to Ottawa by Mr. Goulet, contained a considerable percentage of alcohol, the magistrate imposed a fine of \$300 on each and ordered that they spend one month in jail as well, and, in default of payment, an additional six months was to be served by each. A charge of selling was also laid against the men by Mr. Foster, and they were fined \$300 on that charge, with the stipulation that four months were to be served if this fine was not paid. As the sentences are not to run concurrently this means a term of eleven months for each. Dan McCrue, who was the owner of the milk cans which had been turned into a still by the men, was charged with assisting in the making by the loan of the cans, knowing for what purpose they were to be used. This charge was dismissed.

Officer Van McCready laid a charge of having liquor in a place other than his private dwelling against Albert Fafetelle. The officer seized three gallons of high wines and a few bottles of gin from the accused on a train coming west from Montreal. A fine of \$200 or four months was imposed in this case.

TOTS KEEP VIGIL OVER DEAD PARENTS

Liquor Caused Tragic Murder
and Suicide in Detroit.

Detroit, Dec. 13.—Three trembling children stood vigil Wednesday night over the dead bodies of their father and mother, Michael and Mary Simak, in their home at 8,026 West Jefferson Avenue. Simak, 33 years old, came home intoxicated at midnight and demanded money from his wife. When she refused to give it to him he shot her dead. He then sent a bullet through his own brain. The children, Julian, aged 10, Arenas, aged 7, and Stella, aged 5, were witnesses of the double tragedy. Fear kept them from calling help, and it was not until daylight that the boy mustered up enough courage to visit the home of a neighbor and tell of his parent's death.

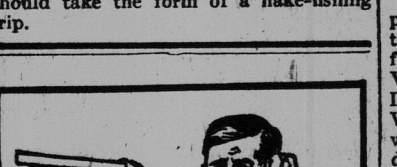

1,021 SAVED BY COAST GUARD

Commandant Reports 220 Vessels Lost During the Fiscal Year.

Washington, Dec. 13.—Coast guard cutters and stations saved the lives of or rescued from peril 1,021 persons during the twelve months ending June 30, according to the annual report made by Captain W. E. Reynolds, commandant of the service.

Assistance was given to vessels carrying 14,013 persons and valued, with their cargoes, at \$66,260,445, the total instances of lives saved and vessels assisted numbering 1,938.

In addition, the service gave miscellaneous assistance to persons and ships in 885 instances. Two hundred and twenty-two American merchant craft of 122,287 tons were lost, says the report. Five hundred and fifty-five other American merchant vessels were involved in casualties involving damage of \$800 or more.

Two hundred and six persons lost their lives in these 777 casualties, seven of the number being passengers and the others members of ships' crews. The value of the property lost was \$34,922,081.

A CALL TO PRAYER

To the Editor of The Times: Sir,—May I pass on to your readers the following extracts from two startling and significant articles which have appeared recently in the daily press? One, entitled "England Has No Time for God," from the pen of James Douglas, appeared in The Express (London, England), and later in The Montreal Star; the other, "The World's Deepest Need," in The Globe (Toronto).

From the former we take the following:

"Over all the land the old grey towers and spires of the churches still bear witness to the faith that has grown cold, but they are empty churches. The empty church is the rule; their bells no longer summon people to prayer. England has no time for God. The hungry sleep look up from the shepherds of the soul. Never has the spiritual pulse of the nation been so feebly. England is not easy in her mind and conscience. She is distressed by a profound spiritual malady, a sickness of soul. In her misery she has sought for all sorts of narcotics. She has gone mad about games, rather than look steadily at her tormented heart she has flown to every form of artificial excitement, losing all sense of perspective in her tragical eagerness to escape from the ills of her inner self, and each day in turn has nauseated her sick soul."

"There is a mania for materialistic self-indulgence for the stimulation of the senses. The hard set faces bent upon some witless delight, some brainless pleasure, are seen in every rank. There is a dull incapacity for the higher joy, the finer rapture of existence. There is an ignoble fear of solitude and silence, a dread of contemplation. The empty faces are signs of the empty souls. England has no time for God."

"But the law of life is reaction. The tidal wave of materialism has nearly reached its highest point. It has subverted the conscience and drowned spirituality. There will be a revival. England must find time for God."

"We feel that it is so disquietingly true as touching our present condition," adds the Star, "that we repeat it."

Not less weighty is the following from The Globe:

"The uncertainty, perplexity and disappointment universally experienced since the armistice, the troubles in Ireland, India, Silesia, Russia, economic disturbance intensify the concern felt by men everywhere and impel the inquiry, 'What will show us any good?' It is, therefore, singularly timely that at such a juncture the words spoken by Sir Robert Falconer should be pressed on the attention of all who feel the seriousness of the issues now before mankind."

"There is a time when human aid fails and human beings are powerless, and when we must turn to ourselves for help. There are more things wrought by prayer than most men believe. We who do believe in prayer should turn ourselves to supplication now on behalf of Britain. There is no other way that I can see."

"While this has special reference to British problems it is specially applicable to the church. The supreme need of the present hour is for a worldwide revival in the Church of God without reference to sect—not a Forward Movement, but a Downward Movement in penitence and faith at the foot of the Cross—the only place where men can get right with God."

"We would, therefore, suggest that all readers of this paper who are members of the Church which is His body, should spend the winter of 1921-22 in the presence of God in fellowship with others, or in secret, in profound prayer, ringed by the words of a sense of the offensiveness of sin, of realization of the meaning of Calvary and of the double-edged enthusiasm for God that the world has ever known."

There is a secret in true prayer just as there is a secret in wireless telegraphy. In dispatching wireless messages the transmitter must be adjusted to precisely the same number of vibrations per second as the receiver or the message will not be caught. If prayer is to be effective one must be in adjustment with God. If ye abide in Me and My words abide in you, ye shall ask what ye will and it will be done unto you. Shall we claim the promise and together at the hour appointed send a united cry to God for revival? B. C. R.

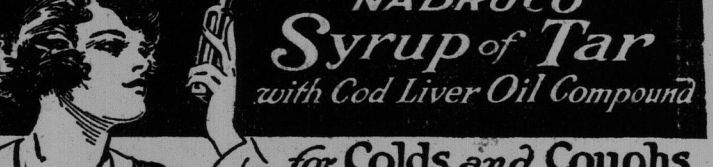

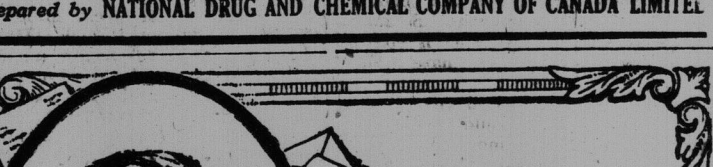

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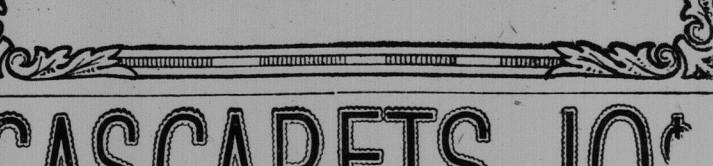
