

ALLIES SWEEP ON TO GREAT VICTORY

Advancing on Sixty Mile Front And Gaining Much Ground

Chateau-Thierry Recaptured - Germans Driven Across Marne With Tremendous Losses in Men and Materiel - Collapse of Crown Prince's Army

Victories for the Allied arms in France continue to multiply. Over the entire sixty mile front running from Soissons to Rheims the Allied troops are fighting with a determination that brooks no denial of their efforts.

Further goodly-sized indentations have been made in the German line between Soissons and Chateau-Thierry by the American and French troops, and almost all the gains made by the Germans in their recent drive south of the Marne and toward the vicinity of Rheims have been blotted out under the counter attacks of the Americans, French, British and Italians.

THREE MILES BEHIND LINES

Acting in harmony with the movement on Chateau-Thierry, American and French troops northwest of the city struck the Germans another hard blow, broke through the German lines and drove through at some points more than three miles. Large numbers of prisoners were taken and the machine guns of the Allied troops literally mowed down the Germans who endeavored to stay their progress.

To the north along the Oureq Valley the French are making good progress toward the important junction town of Nantouillet-Notre Dame, which the operations south and southeast of Soissons are keeping time with those along the other parts of the front.

The entire southern bank of the Marne has been cleared of enemy forces, French, British and Italian troops are now harassing those southwest of Rheims, and they have been forced to fall back in the Courton Wood, the Ardre Valley and near St. Euphrase, notwithstanding their desperate resistance.

The number of British operating with the Allied forces in this region is not known. The first announcement that they were in the area was made Saturday night and doubtless they represent a portion of the great reserves that everywhere are being brought up along the battle line in an endeavor to make secure the victories already won and enlarge them.

With the capture of Chateau-Thierry and the last progress of the French and Americans westward from the northern sectors, the plight of the Germans in the southwestern portion of the Soissons-Rheims salient becomes increasingly disastrous, and it is not improbable that when stock is finally taken large numbers of prisoners and quantities of guns and war stores will be found to have been taken by the Allied troops.

Aviators continue to lend assistance to the troops of General Foch, scouting the back areas and harassing the retreating Germans with their machine guns. Notable work has been done by American Indians for General Foch's men the Aborigines taking a prominent part, in characteristic western fashion, in scouting in the Marne region.

Prisoners and Guns. Washington, July 21-Prisoners captured by American troops in offensive on the Aisne-Marne front up to an early hour Saturday totaled by actual count, 17,000, General Pershing reported in his communique for yesterday received tonight by the war department.

Despite counter-attacks and rearguard actions of a desperate nature, the Americans advanced steadily early, says the communique. The towns of Courmoulin, Rozoy, St. Amand and Mussy had been entered by the Americans before 1 o'clock Saturday morning.

Brilliant Work at Front. London, July 20-An official report on aerial operations tonight says: "Early on July 19, several long reconnaissances were carried out by us and many photographs were taken of the enemy's back area. Work with the artillery and bombing were continued throughout the day.

Over seventeen tons of bombs were dropped on hostile ammunition dumps, railway stations and air bases in one of the raids on a hostile airplane the machines dropped their bombs from between 100 and 500 feet. One pilot landed on the airfield and swept the hangars with his machine gun before rising again.

Hostile machines and six balloons were brought down. Seven of our machines are missing.

A strong west wind blowing and low clouds continually drifting up, our machines dropped fourteen tons of bombs on Vincennes and on the stations at Vincennes and Sables, a direct hit being obtained on a train at the last-named place. All our machines returned again have taken up their advances in Albania. On Saturday, says the Italian war office statement today, Point Isonzo on the crest of Mali Silvas in the bend of the Devoll river south of Ribasco was captured. Up to July 19, 2,167 prisoners and twenty-six guns were captured.

On the Sea. London, July 21-An enemy submarine attacked a tow off the east-most point of Cape Cod today, sank three barges, set a fourth and their tug on fire and dropped four shells on the mainland. The action lasted an hour and was unchallenged except for two hydroplanes from the Chatham aviation station, which circled over the U-boat causing her to submerge for a short time only to reappear and resume firing.

The crews of the tow numbering forty-one and including three women and five children, escaped amid the shell fire in life boats. Several were wounded, but only one seriously. This happened to be John Botwinich, an American of the crew of the tug. His right arm near the shoulder was torn away by a fragment of shell. The minor injuries of the others were from shell splinters.

The headed fight took place three miles south of the Orleans coastguard station which is located midway between Chatham and the extreme tip of the Cape. The firing was heard for miles and brought thousands to the beach from which the flashes of the guns and the outline of the U-boat were plainly visible.

Possible danger to the onlookers was not thought of until a shell whizzed over their heads and splashed in a pond a mile inland. Three other shells buried themselves in the sands of the beach.

DISCUSSED PROPOSAL FOR HOSPITAL WING

The possibility of a new military hospital in St. John created as an addition to the General Public Hospital, somewhat similar to the addition to the St. John County Hospital, had probably been a much larger scale, was discussed at a conference here on Saturday between Hon. Frank B. Carroll, federal minister of public works, and Brigadier-General Macdonell, G.O.C. military district No. 7.

Hon. Mr. Carroll called to the city on Sunday and was here but a short time, leaving again for Halifax. Stanley Keelin, M.P., accompanied the minister to his quarters.

Later in the morning Hon. Mr. Carroll visited the General Public Hospital, where the mayor, Senator Daniel, Dr. G. A. A. A. and Dr. Heddon, superintendent of the General Public Hospital, were present. The proposal to provide for military purposes an addition to the General Public Hospital was discussed. It was said afterwards that no definite arrangement has yet been reached, but it is understood that the fact of being proposed to be agreed upon the proposal to build a wing to the General Public Hospital for military purposes will meet with the favor of the minister, if such a wing is needed. One idea is that if the plan is decided upon, the dominion and provincial governments will bear half the expenditure and after the war the building will be handed over to the municipality.

Now it is known that proposals have been made by this government to Japan which are, to say the least, much more favorable toward intervention in Siberia, though nothing is being officially admitted at the state department here.

It is practically admitted that the negotiations are really being carried on at Tokyo, a high official of the state department admitting that "of course they know more about the situation there than we do here."

The president told advisers, ten days ago, that he was considering military intervention to save the Russian situation, but so far had not been able to work out a physical plan of doing so. It is pointed out that the United States has a much larger force of trained troops in Panama than could possibly be needed in any emergency down there and that perhaps some of them might be sent over to Siberia if a decision calling for a large American expedition should be agreed on with Japan.

Favors Immediate Help. London, July 20-Lord Robert Cecil, who has just left the post of minister of blockade to become assistant secretary of state for foreign affairs, in an interview with The Associated Press last night argued the necessity of the British Allies sending immediate help to the Czechoslovak forces along the trans-Siberian railroad.

"The presence of a Czechoslovak army in Russia at this time is, I believe, one of the greatest misfortunes of the world plunged into such an appalling state of disorganization that nothing like it is known in our history-situation here so unprecedented that the world seemed merely to stand aghast, hopeless."

"Then suddenly, we find this Czechoslovak army well drilled, carefully organized and ably fed; we suddenly find this army stretched across the backbone of the Russian empire over a line nearly 5,000 miles long. It is the only organized force we know of in the whole of Russia today making for and even the elementary principles of order and civilization."

"If the Allies allow it to be wiped out for want of ammunition, food or moral support, there is absolutely no reason left to leave the lump, and small hope remains of preventing the Russian people from being overwhelmed by a terrible series of economic disasters during the coming winter."

"I have recently heard men who know Russia well speak of what is likely to happen there during the coming winter under the present chaotic conditions. One authority estimated that 20,000,000 people would perish as a

ANTHRACITE COAL SITUATION. (Bangor Commercial)

Reports from the anthracite coal mining sections are not very satisfactory, for it appears that the production for the first quarter of the current coal year has fallen materially short of the programme that was planned and which it was expected could be carried out. The allotment made by the fuel administration was based upon an estimated production of 64,845,788 tons of domestic anthracite for the coal year. The actual output of domestic anthracite for the three months period to the end of June was 18,978,889 tons. That is at the rate of 68,120,000 tons for the year or 1,226,000 tons less than was counted upon in the estimate.

Unless there can be accomplished a decided pick-up in the output, and only that will be necessary proportionately to cut down on the allotments of domestic anthracite to the New England and Atlantic states.

FOUR FIRES IN CITY ON SATURDAY

There was a regular epidemic of fires in the city on Saturday and the department was called out four times during the day. The first alarm was rung shortly after 1 o'clock for a blaze in an awning over the store of T. H. Haley in Charlotte street. The second was rung in at seven o'clock for a slight fire in Gibbon's fuel warehouse, Smythe street. Little damage resulted. The third was sounded shortly afterwards for a fire in C. H. Peters Sons, Ltd., in Ward street. This blaze caused considerable damage. A considerable quantity of hay was destroyed and the building quite badly gutted. About eleven o'clock on Saturday night another alarm was sounded for a blaze in a house occupied by Michael Marston, 151 Mill street. The fire started from an upset lamp, but the blaze was extinguished before much damage was done.
