LITTLE DANGER NOW OF GIANTS OR ATHLETICS FAILING TO WIN

McGraw Pleased With Larry McLean and Says Former St. John Player Has Steadied The Giants

New York, Aug. 16.—There is now little danger of either the Giants or the Athletics losing in their respective leagues. Both have comfortable leads for the middle of August, with fairly soft spots ahead, and neither one of the second class has shown sufficient class to press either leader for the last month.

I don't see how any team can stop the Athletics. They are far and away the class of the American League, and the only team that has the shortage of good experienced pitchers, which Clarke Griffith said some time ago would develop out of the pennant. But clever "Comie" Mack has remedied this by developing three youngsters who are performing brilliantly at present. These are Brown, Shawkey and Bush. He will now be able to ease up on Bender and Plank and give them some of the rest which they will need before the world's series sets in.

The Athletics have an easier schedule to face for the next two weeks, when they will meet the western clubs, the weak portion of the American League, than the Cleveland boys have. Cleveland will be playing Philadelphia, Boston, Washington and New York. The Athletics and Senators are naturally robust teams and hard to beat. The Yankees have found Cleveland to be the one club that they could give a battle to all summer. The Naps will have no cinch with the Athletics.

While Cleveland is meeting the stronger easterners, the Athletics will be playing St. Louis, Detroit and Chicago, three teams which have fallen down in the race badly within the last month. The Athletics should come home far enough ahead to be able to loaf to the finish.

The Giants are in just as comfortable a position as the Athletics. My team slipped into a little slump on the road, and some of the players worried themselves into a hitting decline for a time, but it is going strong now with a long string of games at home ahead. The addition of McLean has helped the Giants. Mechanically, he is one of the best batters in the league, but he must be carefully handled. He has told me he is very eager to make good in New York and is taking care of himself. I know he has a reputation as a bad actor, but he has promised that he will change his reputation here, and I have

offered him a reward which should induce him to do it.

When the Giants were in Cincinnati recently
