MAY FIGHT

England and France Embodied

BY A FORCE OF THE LATTER IN VADING THE SOUDAN.

Understand, Sept. 12—The Khedive, Abdulla, a few days before the arrival here of the Anglo-Egyptian army, heard that a force of white men had occupied Fashoda, a town on the west bank of the White Nile, and capital of a very fertile and densely populated district. Fashoda is about four hundred miles south of Khartoum. The Khedive immediately sent two steamers to investigate the report, and one of them returned here and surrendered to Sir Herbert Kitchener. The commander of the steamer reported that on his arrival at Fashoda he found the place occupied by a force of French. The latter opened a heavy fire on the steamer, which narrowly escaped destruction. The crew, losing many men in killed and wounded. The British commander will send the flotilla of gunboats up the White Nile to investigate.

VERY ANGRY.

French Must Get out of Sudan or Fight Great Britain.

London, Sept. 12—The London press is very angry at the French invasion of the Sudan. They say this is the Marchand expedition, and that it must be bundled out at once. The Spectator puts the British imperialist view concisely:—"The French must be bundled out of Fashoda without further ceremony, and France must decide whether she wishes to fight the matter out in the field, or to accept the terms of the British ultimatum."

The New York Sun has called his paper: "Great Britain long ago warned France that she would not tolerate any interference in the Nile Valley or with her march from Egypt to Uganda. It has been suggested that Marchand's party may pose as a scientific expedition, thus avoiding immediate trouble, or might otherwise incur on the spot."

THE LADY KALIFA CAUGHT.

Her Husband Had Left Her to Shift for Herself Gen. Kitchener's Proposal.

Understand, Sept. 12—The Anglo-Egyptian cavalry has captured the principal wife of the Khedive, the mother of Osman Digna and Sheikh Eddin. They were found in extreme destitution on the left bank of the Nile. Gen. Sir Herbert Kitchener, the commander of the Anglo-Egyptian expedition, suggests the establishment of an immigration colony and a medical mission in Khartoum in memory of Gen. Gordon. The establishment to be conducted by British tutors, and to be devoted mainly to educating the sons of the Sudanese. They should issue certificates qualifying the holders to fill government posts.

Had the Anarchist for His Crime.

SLEW THE EMPRESS OF AUSTRIA AS AN EXAMPLE—DETAILS OF THE AFFAIR.

Geneva, Switzerland, Sept. 12—Further details of the assassination of the Empress of Austria show that Her Majesty was walking from her hotel to the landing place of the steamer about one o'clock when an Italian Anarchist suddenly approached and stabbed her to the heart. The Empress fell, got up again, and was carried to the steamer unconscious. The boat started, but seeing the Empress had not recovered consciousness the captain returned, and the Empress was carried to the Hotel Beauvivre, where she expired. The murderer is a man named Lauchoni. He was born in Paris, of Italian parentage.

The Empress had been stopping at the Hotel Beauvivre for several days. It was at first thought the wound was not serious.

MADE LIGHT OF IT.

After having been stung from behind, the Empress rose and walked on board the steamer, where she fell, fainting. The captain did not wish to put from the quay, but as at the request of the Empress and her suite, there being no apprehension that she was seriously hurt. The steamer was turned back before reaching the open lake, and the Empress, unconscious, was carried to the hotel on a stretcher, where she died at three o'clock.

THE ASSASSIN.

After striking the blow he ran along the Rue des Alpes, with the evident intention of entering the square Des Alpes, but before reaching it he was seized by two cabmen, who had witnessed the crime. They handed him to a waiting Anarchist, who conveyed him to the police station. The prisoner made no resistance. He even sang as he walked along, saying: "I did it, and 'She must be dead.' At the police station he declared that he was a 'starving Anarchist' with no hatred for the poor, but only for the rich."

Interrogated by the magistrate he said he came to Geneva with the intention of killing the Duc d'Orleans, but the latter had already left. Lucien (the assassin) followed the Duc to Evian, about 25 miles north-east of Geneva, on the lake, where he was again unsuccessful. He then returned to Geneva, and learned from the papers of the presence of the Austrian Empress. Yesterday he

but found no opportunity to carry out his purpose, though he watched the Hotel Beauvivre all day. This afternoon, about 12 o'clock he said he saw the value of the Empress leaving the hotel and going toward the landing. He inferred from this that the Empress was going to take the steamer, and he hid himself behind a tree on the quay, with the file concealed in his right sleeve. In a few minutes, the Empress, accompanied by her lady of honor, appeared, and the assassin struck the file home. Lucien confessed that he has been an anarchist since he was 15 years old. "If all Anarchists did their duty, as I have done mine," he said, "anarchy would soon disappear." He admitted that he knew the crime was useless, but said he committed it for the sake of example.

CANT BE HANGED.

Geneva, Sept. 12—The president of the government were stunned with horror and grief when the news reached the palace that the Empress, so beloved by all Europeans, had fallen a victim to an assassin within the borders of their country. They immediately began to hold an extraordinary federal council Sunday morning, to take steps against the assassin. The latter must be tried according to the statutes of the canton in which the crime was committed, which forbid capital punishment, and make life imprisonment the most severe penalty which can be imposed.

ONE OF A BAND.

Paris, Sept. 12—The police here believe the murder the result of a plot of Italian Anarchists, and that the assassin is identical with one Lucien, who is wanted by the Swiss police as a dangerous Anarchist. While at Zurich Lucien was present at a meeting of Italian Anarchists, when seven were selected, including Lucien, to assassinate the principal European sovereigns, including the King of Italy. A French detective, who was present at the meeting in disguise, warned the French foreign office, which communicated its information to the Italian government. About a week ago another meeting of the same band of Anarchists was held at Zurich, and those who had been selected at the previous meeting were accused of not doing their duty. Lucien said: "I will show them I am no coward. I will kill some one." The following day he left Zurich and went to Fashoda, proceeding thence to Geneva.

GRIEF STRICKEN MONARCH.

Vienna, Sept. 12—The Countess Stephanie, one of the Empress' ladies-in-waiting, telegraphed the awful news to Adjutant-General Count Paar, who received the message about four o'clock, and upon him fell the painful task of informing the Emperor. The Emperor Paar informed the Emperor of the murder. His Majesty was wholly overcome. He went to the ground, groaning, and cried:—"Ah! I do not to be spared any pain or grief in this world!" Late this evening the Emperor said to the Lord Chamberlain, Prince Lichtenstein:—"It is incomprehensible that anyone should lay a hand upon a woman who throughout her life has done nothing but good actions."

A POST MORTEM.
Bern, Sept. 12—Emperor Francis Joseph telegraphed the Austrian minister, Count Von Kuefstein, to consent to a post-mortem examination. Dr. Reverdin, Dr. Megevaus and M. Golday, Mayor of Geneva, were instructed with the examination of the wound on behalf of the judicial authorities, and accordingly proceeded to the hotel, where they carried out the instructions. At the close of the examination, they announced that death was caused by internal hemorrhage from a triangular lacerated wound. They decided that the injury was of a character to leave grounds for the theory which had been advanced, that the Empress, who suffered from weakness of the heart, might have succumbed simply to the shock of the blow.

WENT CRAZY.
Vienna, Sept. 12—The shock of the news created one of the court servants who rushed from the palace to Burgholzli, shrieking: "Where is the murderer of our Empress?"

The Empress of Austria, was born in the year 1837. She was a daughter of Duke Maximilian of Bavaria, and was married April 24, 1854. They had three children, the Archduchess Gisela, who is married to Prince Ludwig of Bavaria; the Archduchess Rudolph, who married Princess Stephanie of Belgium, and who was seemingly assassinated in 1889, and the Archduchess Franz Salvator of Austria-Tuscany.

HE IS NOT INSANE.

Wealthy Blenheim Farmer Brings Action for Conspiracy.

Claims They Tried to Deprive Him of Management of His Affairs.

Woodstock, Ont., Sept. 12—A writ has been issued on behalf of D. Slavson, a wealthy farmer, of Blenheim township, against Alex. C. Minter, of Blenheim, and Elizabeth J. Beale, of Brantford, the plaintiff's sister, claiming \$5,000 damages for alleged conspiracy. The action promises to be of more than usual interest. In May, 1897, Minter presented a petition to the High Court at Osgoode hall to have it declared that the plaintiff was of unsound mind at that time. After the matter had come up three or four times Minter withdrew the petition, which had been presented by his solicitor, Thomas Brown, of Norwich. It appears that Minter had been dealing with Slavson's property for some time, selling the stock and acting as business manager generally for the estate. After the petition was presented to the High Court the old man was examined by three Woodstock doctors, all of whom declared him to be perfectly sane. He was at that time a bachelor, but has since married. The plaintiff's claim is for \$5,000 damages against the defendants for maliciously presenting the petition to have the plaintiff declared a lunatic, and for conspiracy to deprive the plaintiff of his liberty and of the management of his affairs, also against the defendant, Minter, for an account of his dealings with the plaintiff's property. The case will come up before Chief Justice Meredith in December next.

HARD ON HER.

Catherine Smith, an old colored woman who had neglected to purchase a dog tag, pled to be released from her obligation at police court this morning. Judge Houston, however, reminded her that he had no power. The council sometimes remit fines," he remarked, "but even their power to legally do so is to be questioned." She was fined \$1.
