

them socially successful, and perhaps in some cases personal prejudices have been overcome.

It is for you to judge whether there is yet more advantage to be gained by the plan, or if the impetus already given will be sufficient for a time.

If the increased expense to individual Sir Knights is likely to deprive any one of the benefits that should be gained from inspections, it may not be well to legislate against such individual privilege.

The special committee to whom this question was referred reported recommending that the system be discontinued. An amendment was offered that it be continued with certain modifications, and especially providing that no expense whatever be incurred by the Commandery where the rendezvous is held, but this was rejected and the report adopted.

The following was then passed:—

Resolved, That the Grand Commander be requested to appoint an Inspector General, as is now provided for by the statutes, under such rules and restrictions as he may see fit to adopt.
