NATURAL HISTORY SOCIETY.

At a meeting of the Natural History Society last night, A. Gordon Levitt, New Brunswick's leading ornithologist, gave a very interesting lecture on native birds. He treated of the habits of grebes, loons, ducks, herons, bitterns, reeds, coots, woodcock, snipe, grouse, pigeons, eagles, hawks, owls, kingfishers, woodpeckers, crows, jays, wrens, creepers and warblers.

ST. JOHN IN GRIP OF FIERCE BLIZZARD

Business in All Lines Practically Demoralized.

Street Car Service Stopped Altogether and All Trains Delayed--The Storm is Widespread.

Since Tuesday morning St. John has been in the grip of a blizzard. The impassable condition of the streets has caused practically a suspension of business.

The storm is by far the worst of the season. It began snowing about eleven o'clock yesterday morning. The barometer showed a tendency to fall, portending a cold storm.

The storm appears to be off the Atlantic coast. Along the coast there is a very low pressure, while over the Great Lakes the pressure is high.

In the city the storm has practically put a stop to all activity. The Street Railway Company made every effort to keep their line open, but the strong wind and the hard sleet made this a difficult task.

All the trains were delayed. On the I. C. R. the snow drifts between here and Moncton interfere greatly with traffic.

On the C. P. R. the storm was worse this side of Woodstock. The Prairie Producers' Association has arranged to have a snow plough special to clear the track.

This was a miserable day for the pedestrian. The best place to walk was in the middle of the street. The sidewalk ploughs were of course out but there were too few of them to do much.
