WALRUS' BONES FOUND AT MISCOU.

Interesting Relics Donated to the Natural History Museum.

At the regular monthly meeting of the Natural History Society, held last evening, a large number of donations were received for the library and the following articles for the museum: Nests of trap door spiders, by Mrs. Gilbert Murdoch; a number of epymus specimens, by Dr. L. W. Bailey; geological specimens, by Geoffrey Stead, C. E.; snail weed, by Mrs. Gorbell, and a valuable collection of walrus bones from Miscou, N. B., by Dr. W. F. Ganong.

Mrs. John Bullock, Mrs. Alice S. Cooper and Miss Hester L. Edgcombe were elected associate members. Two papers from Prof. W. F. Ganong were read. In the first the writer traced the history and physiography of the Tracadie River. The name is Indian and means camping ground, and this river was in early times a favorite resort of the aborigines, who were attracted not only by its excellent facilities for camping grounds, but also by the great abundance of sea trout, for which the stream is famous at the present day.

Dr. Ganong's second paper referred to the occurrence of the walrus or sea cow in New Brunswick. The writer spoke of the large number of bones of these animals which are to be found in Miscou, the remains of animals which were slaughtered by early French and Spanish hunters. A large number of bones were collected by Miscou and sent to the society by Prof. Ganong. The skulls of the walrus show bullet holes and axe marks, indicating how they came to an untimely end. These animals probably existed in Miscou in New Brunswick over one hundred and fifty years ago.

The papers were discussed by Dr. Geo. F. Matthews, W. F. Barditt, James A. Esty and Senator Billis.

MODERN METHODS FOR HANDLING ICE.
The St. John Ice Co. met at their new offices, 14 Charlotte street, last evening. The following report was given: During the year new stables have been built on the Sandy Point near the ice house. New hoist machinery direct from the lake to the ice house, in now ready for use. An excellent feature of this new machinery is that all the ice passes under a system of knives, thereby removing all the rough and snow ice on the surface to a depth of two or three inches, making the ice of uniform thickness, pure and clear.
It is expected that all the ice will be harvested early in January, before it gets too thick and unwieldy. These improvements make the plant the most up to date in Canada.

PANIC ON STEAMER CAUSED SEVERAL DEATHS

HAVANA, Dec. 5.—A wild panic on board the French line steamer La Champagne this afternoon resulted in the injury of six and possible drowning of three to six persons. The vessel arrived from French and Spanish ports with 250 cabin and 1,400 steerage passengers.

After anchoring and discharging the cabin passengers she began cooling. The crowd of immigrants swarming to her side to watch the lighters, caused her to list and to take on a quantity of water in her open coil ports. Some of the lightermen cried out that the ship was sinking, and the frightened immigrants struggled and fought for a chance to escape.
