TOLSTOI, MAN OF PEACE, PREACHES REVOLUTION.

He Has Been Convinced That the Animal-Like Fight in Russia
Cannot End Till the Government Yields and Ceases
Its Policy of Repression

BERLIN, April 30.—Count Tolstoi's revolutionary pamphlet, which was prohibited in Russia, is to be brought out here in a fortnight. It is entitled "The Way to Social Liberty." Although it embraces a dual appeal to both the Russian Government and the people, its chief aim is to arouse the latter to the belief that the only cure is in a successful revolution. Tolstoi practices a repudiates his former principle of passive resistance and boldly declares for a war against the present Government to the death, each individual being inspired by what God has at all times demanded for the existence of human beings.

Tolstoi relates a conversation with two workmen who had much to do with the change of view. In part he says: "They made it clear to me that only through the struggle of the Government—not only the execution, but the arrest and banishment—could this fearful animal-like fight of a people be stopped."

"I am now strongly convinced that the best the Government can do is to give in to the revolutionists, but at the same time such a proposition on my part may be considered an expression of my insanity, and I am also reminded of persons near me—revolutionists, conservatives, peasants—unhappy revolutionists manufacturing bombs, unhappy men, misguided people ordered before field court-martials, and then shot—I am reminded of them. They all put the same question, 'What shall we do?' 'And I now reply, 'You shall not do what the Czar's minister and soldiers, or even the chairman of the revolutionary committees compelled you to do. You shall do what you wish, to you as men, following the power sent into the world, which gave you a definite and known divine law known as conscience. Finally, do only that which at all times God has demanded, so that the absurd and destructive fog now existing will disappear.'"

KING OTTO, MAD RULER OF BAVARIA, IS NOW 59

Insane Monarch Begins Sixtieth Year
Strong in Body, Mentally
Unimpaired.

MUNICH, April 30.—With little visible change apparent, although his physical condition since he ascended the throne of Bavaria twenty-two years ago, the mad King Otto today entered upon the sixtieth year of his life. For many years he has never been seen outside the grounds of Fuerstentried Castle. He has been hopelessly insane since the summer of 1884, his kingdom being ruled by a regent, yet the royal title is still used in the use of pieces of clay surrounded by a host of lackeys and servants, who approach and serve their insane master with all outward signs of homage and respect, while they and all the world know of his utter decay for he is the King.

Reports from time to time have told that the King has become worse. Those in a position to know, however, state that this is not true, and that there has been little change in his condition since he ascended the throne.

He was hopelessly insane then, as he is now. His lucid intervals always have been few and of short duration. He is totally ignorant of his terrible condition and converses on subjects referring to his immediate surroundings logically and with volubility of speech.

When at his worst his attendants have the greatest difficulty to prevent him filling his mouth with whatever he can lay hands on, and when out walking in the park he has been discovered devouring grass or leaves, and even filling his mouth with earth. Occasionally he will invite the gentlemen of his court to dinner, and while they are discussing the meal, will himself stand with the servants and stealthily nibble at the dainties within his reach.

His medical attendant and the physicians who visit him from time to time are firm in the opinion that the King may still live many years, his digestive faculties being unimpaired. What of a frolicsome disposition he thoroughly enjoys playing at being soldier, but he has become too old and awkward to take a keen relish in climbing trees, once his favorite pastime. In his religious devotion he has been known to exhibit great piety, and the celebration of the mass has invariably a soothing influence on his distracted mind.
