The funeral of the late Mrs. Esther Anderson took place at 1:30 this afternoon from her late residence at David street. Rev. S. Howard officiated and interment was in Fernhill.

The first forest fire of the season started on Sunday afternoon near J. Hunter left at five o'clock and on arrival promptly secured men and commenced to fight the flames. Some thirty men went out with fifty buckets soon made an impression on the flames. Fortunately the wind on Monday was a moderate one and this made the work easier. At noon the fire was under control and at six o'clock it was all out. The property burned over was about 200 acres in extent. The fire burned a path about a mile long. It is owned by James Alton and was cut over during the winter.—Sussex Record.

MAHONEY GIVEN TWO YEARS FOR STEALING THE STOVES.

Counsel Made a Strong Plea for Mercy—Unable to Get a Jury in the Golding-Wood Stealing Case

The criminal docket was taken up at this morning's session of the county court. William Golding and Joseph London were brought into court. The charge of robbing Mrs. Hambley Wood on Sydney street on Good Friday last, was read to the prisoners. Both pleaded not guilty. A complete jury was not present and Judge Forbes adjourned the court until 12 o'clock, and the sheriff was instructed to summon twenty jurors. At the appointed hour only about ten jurors were present and these had all sent in applications to be excused from service. The jurors at the first session of the court this morning were all challenged by the counsel for the defense, with the exception of Andrew McNichol, F. E. Law and R. R. Batchford.

At 12:45 o'clock a complete jury had not been secured and Judge Forbes ordered that Wm. Mahoney be brought into court. The prisoner had elected to be tried under the Speedy Trials Act and his honor thought it best to deal with this case while the court waited for more jurors.

After the charge had been read, Mahoney pleaded guilty of stealing two ranges and two small stoves. His statement was that he did not steal three ranges as the charge read. B. L. Gerow, who appeared for the prisoner, read letters from Dr. Kennell and W. H. Mowatt. Mr. Gerow also produced an affidavit from the prisoner's sister which stated that the prisoner had received a fall in the cotton mills here and sustained injuries from which he never fully recovered. Counsel for the defense asked for the mercy of the court for the prisoner, Dr. D. E. Berryman, who was in the court, stated that he had been summoned to the cotton mill about ten years ago at the time of the accident. He knew that Mahoney had been in the mill, but when a man is found guilty, the law must be carried out. He therefore sentenced Mahoney to two years in Dorchester Penitentiary. His honor offered to send the letters of recommendation to the Minister of Justice for further consideration. Judge Forbes stated to the prisoner that if he knew of others implicated in the thefts at the McClary warehouse, he would be back again in giving their names. Mahoney was then taken back to jail.

Sheriff Ritchie was directed not to let Mahoney go to Dorchester until a reply is received from the Minister of Justice. Mahoney has a wife and two children. The scene in the court room this morning was a sad one when Mahoney was sentenced. His sister who had sent the affidavit was so overcome with grief that she was obliged to adjourn to the anti-room. The prisoner himself took the sentence hard and when he was being led back to jail, tears streamed from his eyes. The case of Golding vs. London will be taken up at 2:30 this afternoon. Not for many years has so much trouble been experienced in getting a jury. Two panels were exhausted and when the court adjourned two more jurors were needed.
