DARING WOMAN SAVES KOREAN FROM DEATH. Feminine Courage and Wit Hold Inmate Oriental at Bay Until Police Arrive.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 20.—By the "deceitful and quick-witted" daring of Mrs. Joe Miller, Young Sun Shiang, a wealthy Korean rancher of Upland, was saved from death today, at the hands of Chung Ho Hai, an inmate and infuriated fellow countryman and former employe. Mrs. Miller, to whom Shiang, already freed from a prison in the breast, appealed for help, hid him in her closet and hid his burrowing efforts from the police. Then Hai fled, and the Korean, with his head, ending his life by a bullet through the heart.

PRIEST SAVES PAUPER FROM DISSECTING KNIFE. Days Plot and Ghos Christian Burial at His Own Expense.

QUIDERSPORT, Pa., July 20.—When Felix Doyle, a lumberman, died he had neither kind nor kin and it was at this time that the Rev. Father Sheehan, of this city, came to the front, took charge of the funeral arrangements and at his own expense gave the poor fellow Christian burial. Doyle had been ill and he was taken to the Potter County almshouse. The priest visited him frequently. "There is a rule at the county poorhouse that unclaimed bodies of paupers shall be sent to the Anatomical School in Philadelphia, which means that the bodies find their way to the dissecting table in the medical schools. Doyle had no one to take an interest in him, says the good priest, so when arrangements were being made to ship the body he announced that he would not permit it. He sent for an undertaker, provided a burial plot and buried the woodman with the service of the church.

MOB ATTACKS POLICE IN RIOTS IN BELFAST

Row Between Nationalists and Orangemen Leads to Brisk Fight. BELFAST, Ireland, July 20.—The Nationalist quarter of this city was the scene today of serious rioting, owing to the disturbed state of the district since the conflicts between the Nationalists and Orangemen yesterday. A large force of police has been drafted, and guards are stationed in various sections of the quarter. Several encounters occurred between the police and the mob, the latter attacking the guards with stones and bottles. The police made several charges with their clubs, and a large number of rioters and officers were injured.

ANOTHER CONGRESS ON OPIUM TRAFFIC

Washington Invites Countries to Meet at Hague—For Entire Suppression. WASHINGTON, July 20.—The State Department has requested all the countries which participated in the meeting of the International Opium Congress at Shanghai, China, last February, to send delegates to a second conference to be held at The Hague in the near future, where means will be considered for the international control of the production, manufacture and trade in opium with a view to the complete suppression of the use of opium except for medicinal purposes. Hamilton Wright, who was one of the American delegates to the conference at Shanghai in preparing a programme to govern the discussion of the conference. It is hoped by the department that the conference will also take up the question of the use of opium and other narcotics and habit forming drugs. Mr. Wright is preparing legislation for submission to Congress which, if enacted, will place the manufacture and interstate traffic in habit forming drugs under the supervision of the Bureau of Internal Revenue.

STOLE ART GEMS FOR AMERICA

Police Idea of the Murderer Delaunay's Career—Fine Collection in His Safe. PARIS, July 20.—A search of the rooms occupied by Delaunay, the man suspected of the murder of a priest, church and museum robberies in France, who yesterday, when an attempt was made to arrest him, shot and killed Sub-Chief Blot of the detective service and mortally wounded M. Blot's secretary, M. Nage, a view which he committed suicide, confirmed the suspicion that he was engaged in the robbery of a safe. A complete burglar's outfit was found and a safe was discovered to contain a large quantity of jewelry, twelve superb emeralds on copper, six sculptured ivory, twenty three diamonds, and other valuable articles. The collection showed such expert knowledge that only a trained antiquarian could have dictated the choice.
