DUKE WITH THREE OBJECTS

Franz Josef of Bavaria Visits America to See Pretty Girls, Sail His Yacht and Shoot Bears.

New York, N. Y., Aug. 18.—Duke Franz Josef Michael Karl Maria Evariste Quirinus Ottakar of Bavaria, is calling on America. He came to see pretty girls, to sail a yacht and to shoot a grizzly. He expects to find the girls in New York, the yacht is waiting for him at Newport and the grizzly is prowling somewhere among the tall spruces of the Rockies.

The duke is 22 years old, a slim youth who seems partial to English tailors. He is a trifle under the average height, but he moves with the spring of an athlete. A soldier by profession, he holds a commission at lieutenant in the Kaiser's first regiment of Ulans and at home he is known as a crack horseman.

Not Close to Throne. The duke is somewhat remote from the throne of the constitutional monarchy of Bavaria. His grand uncle, Prince Luitpold reigns there and governs in the stead of the mad king and has so many direct descendants that King Ludwig's line may wait a long time.

The young man smiled good humoredly when somebody asked him if he came to America to find a wife. It was not his intention to get married for some time, he said. Would his rank preclude marriage with a commoner? Not at all.

"It would be necessary to get the consent of the Prince Regent, the head of our house," said Duke Franz. "But I would like to have it said that I did not come here to get married."

After getting settled at the Plaza, where apartments were got for him by the German Legation at Washington, Duke Franz went for an automobile ride up in Westchester. He likes speedy cars and the driver gave him a fast run. Back in town again he visited the Metropolitan Museum for an hour and then looked for more fresh air in Central Park.

COMMISSION ON TECHNICAL EDUCATION HEARS EVIDENCE ON CONDITIONS IN ST. JOHN

The first session of the Royal Commission on Industrial Training and Technical Education opened in the Board of Trade rooms yesterday morning.

The meeting was called to order by Mr. T. H. Estabrooks, president of the Board of Trade, after which the secretary, Thomas Benough, read His Majesty's proclamation, all standing. The proclamation recounted in detail the personnel of the commission, and their authority to take evidence on the matters pertaining to technical and industrial training, and report their findings to the Minister of Labor.

"We pursue our enquiries on the authority of the government," said he, "to ascertain the extent of our public resources. To instruct the people in making the most of their assets. We are gathering information in every province of Canada, with the endorsement of all the provincial governments. This commission is not concerned with the oratorical abilities of the people. Every witness is put under oath, so that the information will be of a substantial nature."

"We have discovered a good many things in the Maritime Provinces, and I think that we have done much to give the citizens an intelligent knowledge of the extent and nature of their industrial advantages."

"St. John should be a most advantageous point for our enquiries, judging from the full list of witnesses which has been prepared."

The first witness to be sworn was His Worship Mayor James H. Frink. In reply to questions from the chair, Mayor Frink replied that the number of industries in the city was not increasing. The city had many industries, and of a varied nature. It was to a certain extent an agricultural centre, but more in the nature of a consuming than a distributing centre.

When asked if there was any school for technical training in St. John, His Worship said that the only one he knew of was the manual training school.

High Schools. He expressed himself in favor of the establishment of night schools for technical education. He thought such a school would meet with hearty co-operation.

When asked by Mr. Simpson what taxes were imposed on laboring men, the Mayor described the workings of the labor license. A fee of \$7.50 is required from non-taxpaying laborers, and no one is allowed to work who does not pay the poll-tax or labor license, except at his (the Mayor's) discretion.

Our ship-building industry was shattered by the introduction of iron ships. St. John has aspirations to be the Liverpool of America, and with that object, has created some excellent shipping facilities.

The industrial development of St. John is progressive, and in his opinion the population was also on the increase. The Board of Trade would aid both the laboring and the agricultural classes of the community.

The chairman enquired if the Board of Trade would be willing to supply the needs of the city and help it might be supplied, and notify the commission.

Mr. Estabrooks replied that the discussion might certainly be helpful to the Board of Trade, and he was willing to supplement the work of the commission in any way in their power.

Regarding the fee for drummers and commercial travellers, he was of the opinion that this applied only to peddlers.

E. A. Schofield of Hampton was the next witness called. On being sworn, Mr. Schofield thought that a dairy farm and used the milk for the consumption of the city.

SHORT SHIRT FOR OFFICIAL

The study of Latin, for instance, might produce attention to detail among the workmen in his mill. He did not think that any correspondence course could take the place of personal instruction.

Diversified instruction involves a tremendous scope in this business, Mr. Cudlip thought. A specialized school is much more desirable than a general one.

He considered the cotton industry the most highly specialized of any he had ever heard of. Fifty or seventy-five years ago this was not the case, but one man now has a tendency to remain at one employment permanently.

Charles MacDonald was the next witness called. He stated that he was engaged in the iron working business. Their system of apprenticeship was based on a voluntary understanding of the workers.

The chairman, Mr. J. W. Robertson, arose and stated that as Premier Hazen was present, he would take this occasion to thank him both on behalf of the Premier of Canada and the Royal Commission for the courteous treatment accorded the commission by the province of New Brunswick.

Premier Hazen then rose to express the willingness of himself and his government to co-operate with the commission in any way possible to make their visit a success.

The meeting was then adjourned until eight o'clock in the evening.
