MAYES VS. KING TO BE HEARD

Important Case in Which Action is Taken to Recover Payment for Dredging Before Justice Cassels.

The adjourned sittings of the Exchequer Court will open in the court house this morning, with Mr. Justice Cassels presiding.

The most important case to come up is that of Gershon S. Mayes vs. the King. In this action the plaintiff is represented by Attorney General Hazen and Recorder Baxter, while Dr. A. O. Earle, K. C., E. H. McAlpine, K. C., Dr. W. B. Wallace, K. C., and A. E. Copey will appear for the respondent.

In his petition Mr. Mayes sets forth his claim in detail. The petition first declares that Mr. Mayes held the contracts for certain work to be done in the harbor, and that by statement of account given by Hon. William Pugsley, minister of public works, to Mr. Mayes on August 22, 1908, it was shown that the amount then due him on his contracts was \$56,591.63.

There are also claims for incorrect measurement of the soil removed, such soil being claimed to have been incorrectly measured by the measurement having been taken by officers of the public works department.

Statement of the Defence. The defence in the case has been filed by E. H. McAlpine, K. C., representing the Honorable A. B. Aylesworth, Attorney-General of the Government of Canada.

In reference to the claim that false statements were made by Mr. Mayes the defence will apply this morning to spread their statement to read that he induced the respondents to add a percentage to the measurement of the material in the barges after the material was measured, and that this was done without the knowledge or consent of the Minister of Public Works.

TENDERS AWARDED FOR NEW SCHOOL ON WELDON LOT

School Board Authorizes Making of Contracts Totalling \$48,944--Committee Appointed to Select Name for New Building--Manual Training on West Side Discussed.

At the meeting of the board of school trustees last evening, the report of the building committee recommending the awarding of contracts to B. Mooney and Sons, P. J. Green, J. E. Wilson and others in connection with the building of the new school on the Weldon lot, was adopted and a committee was appointed to select a name for the new school.

Trustee Agar asked if there was a duplicate plan of the school for future reference. The following programme will be carried out: First Session, Tuesday Afternoon, October 11.

Second Session, Tuesday Evening, October 11. 7.30--Songs and devotional service, Rev. H. G. Kennedy.

On motion of Trustee Bullock the architect was instructed to furnish copies of the specifications for the improvements in front of the High school.

Monthly Payment of Bills. Mr. Bullock said bills should be paid once a month, after they had come under the scrutiny of the full board.

Teachers Committee. The teachers committee then submitted their report. They recommended that S. A. Warrell, who has been re-appointed to the High school be given \$550 per year; that the salaries of the reserve teachers on the regular list be \$225; that Mr. Paries, principal of the Victoria school, be given an increase of \$50, and that Miss Tilley be paid at the rate of \$225 while in charge of Miss Scott's school.
