U.N.B. TEAM DEFEATED THE HARRIERS

The football match played in Fredrickton Saturday between the Harriers and U. N. B. resulted in a victory for the latter by a score of 4 to 0, Willis kicking a field goal in the last five minutes of play.

The Harriers kicked off and a scrum followed on the 50 yard line, the St. John boys then got down to business and rushed the ball to U. N. B. 25 yard line. A scrum was called and the Harriers again went forward and the U. N. B. halves were forced to come to the rescue of their scrum by punting. An exchange of kicks followed and the play worked over all the field for the rest of the half.

Doyle, of the Harriers, got the ball in the latter part of the first half with a clear field ahead and would certainly have scored, but Referee Deedes called him offside. His decision in this case is being severely criticized.

The second half was very close, the scrums doing most of the work with the halves of both teams doing good punting and running. The play that won the game for U. N. B., started from a scrum on the Harrier 25 yard line, the ball was passed to Willis who dropped it over the crossbar. From this on till the end of play, neither team had the advantage.

Varsity Win Intercollegiate.
Toronto, Nov. 11.—The Toronto University football team won the title of Intercollegiate Champions this afternoon by defeating Ottawa College 29-13. The Toronto team was hard pressed until the last quarter by the lighter and less experienced boys from Ottawa, but towards the end of the game, after Cornellier the boy "phenom" of the visitors had been held out, piled up a big lead. Toronto University will now play off with Argonauts, interprovincial champions, for the Dominion title, which the college team have held for the past two years, defeating Ottawa Rough Riders and Hamilton Tigers in successive years.

As Billy Foulds and Smirlie Lawson, graduates of Toronto University, who have been starting on the Argonaut team, have stated that they will not play against their own university the students are confident of victory.

McGill Defeats Queens.
Kingston, Nov. 11.—The McGill team had a narrow escape from defeat at the hands of takers in the intercollegiate league today, only winning out over the Queen's University football team in the last quarter, after the score had stood at 19-4 against them with three-quarters of the game over, with the final score of 20-19.
