## SCHOONER LEAKING.

Gloucester, Mass., Oct. 20.—Sch. Fannie H. Stewart, Windsor, N.S., for New York, has arrived here leaking.

## SAVED BY FISHERMEN.

Vineyard Haven, Mass., Oct. 20.—Sch. George Pearl, New York for Liverpool, N.S., was brought into Edgartown yesterday by a crew of fishermen who boarded her at anchor off Surf Side, Nantucket, after her crew had been taken off and landed at Nantucket by life savers. She is not leaking and will proceed after settling claim of fishermen and making necessary repairs to sails.

## BARK ARRIVES AT DIGBY.

Digby, N. S., Oct. 21.—Two weeks out from Sydney, the bark Calbarra, Captain Lewis, the largest wooden sailing ship afloat, arrived at Digby Light yesterday afternoon. Later she was taken in tow by the steamer Granville, but could not get in. After discharging ballast the Calbarra loads over 1,000,000 feet of lumber here for River Platte.

## BURNING LINER ASHORE.

Boston, Oct. 20.—The Johnson line freight steamer Templemore, towed into port during the night by the revenue cutter Androsogin, which found her abandoned at sea with a fire in her hold, dragged her ashore early today and was tossed up on the east side of Lovell's Island in a gale.

The Templemore took fire September 30, in mid-ocean, bound from Baltimore to Liverpool. The crew took to the lifeboats and were picked up several days later.

## SCH. E. MAYFIELD LOST.

Digby, N. S., Oct. 21.—The schooner E. Mayfield, with a cargo of 60,000 brick for the St. John Sugar Refinery, lies at the bottom of the Annapolis River, submerged twenty feet at low water. Captain Burton Merriman, who owned and sailed the schooner, and his three young sons who formed the crew, had a close call from watery graves, getting away in the boat as the vessel was going down. The youngest son, a mere boy, was snatched from his sleep in a bunk just in the nick of time.

The Mayfield left the brick yards of the Nova Scotia Clay Works before daylight Sunday morning, using only motor power. The engine broke down and this left the vessel at the mercy of the swift current on the tide. The Mayfield struck one of the new ice piers in the middle of the river, making a gash in her keel and after remaining afloat five minutes went to the bottom off Allen's Creek. The captain and crew lost all their belongings.

STORM PLAYS  
HAVOC ALONG  
ST. LAWRENCE

Small Crafts Come to Grief  
—No Lives Reported Lost  
—Schooner Wrecked but Crew Rescued.

Quebec, Oct. 21.—A severe storm is raging over the lower St. Lawrence and a number of small craft have come to grief, some wrecked and others waterlogged. No lives have been reported lost.

The schooner Cyrene, belonging to Captain Wilfrid Guilmond, which left here on Thursday last, for Ste Anne Des Monts, with a general cargo, was wrecked near Crane Island, but the crew was taken off.

A schooner belonging to Charles Gagnon, of Murray Bay, is anchored full of water east of Crane Island wharf, while an unknown schooner is ashore west of the same place. Another unknown schooner is adrift in the same locality.

AT LEAST TWO  
ABLE SEAMEN  
IN LIFEBOATS

Senator Lafollette Says  
more Rigid Laws in Mann-  
ing of Boats Necessary for  
Safety of Passengers.

Washington, Oct. 21.—Rigid laws requiring "able seamen" in sufficient numbers to man all lifeboats, were declared by Senator Lafollette today to be necessary for the safety of passengers and crews of vessels on the ocean and the Great Lakes.

Urging the adoption of his own substitute for the Nelson "seaman's service" bill, which President Taft refused to approve, and which is again before the senate, Senator Lafollette said the Nelson bill failed to meet the situation, because it did not require enough experienced and trained men in the deck crews of vessels. The substitute would require at least two able seamen for each lifeboat.

The senate will vote on the seaman's bill Thursday under an agreement that ends all debate at four o'clock that day.

NOTED SCIENTIST AND  
AUTHOR DIED YESTERDAY

Baltimore, Oct. 21.—Dr. Philip Uhler for many years provost of the Peabody Institute of this city, and widely known in scientific circles throughout the country, died at his home here today. He was 78 years old, and had been an invalid for the last two years. Dr. Uhler was the author of many contributions to scientific journals in England and this country.

QUEBEC BRIDGE ONE  
OF FINEST IN WORLD

Over Three Thousand Feet  
Long — Provides Two  
Tracks — Expected to be  
Completed in 1917.

Ottawa, Oct. 21.—Plans for the new Quebec bridge over which the National Transcontinental Railway will cross the St. Lawrence, provide for what it is declared will be the finest bridge structure in the world. The masonry will be of specially massive construction. The bridge itself will measure 3,239 feet over all, and the main span 1,500 feet, while the width from centre to centre of the trusses will measure 88 feet. The bridge will have a clear height above high water of 150 feet. Provision is being made for two railway tracks and two foot walks. The work of construction, which is expected to be completed in 1917, is being carried on under a commission composed of S. N. Monsarrat, chairman, and Chief Engineer Ralph Modjeska and C. C. Schneider, until completion of the bridge communication between N. T. Railway lines on the two sides of the St. Lawrence will be provided car ferry at Quebec.

STEAMSHIP AGENT IN  
AUSTRIA SMUGGLED  
DISGUISE EMIGRANTS

Vienna, Oct. 21.—The Austrian government today, as the result of recent development in the emigration traffic from Austria to Canada and the United States, introduced into the Lower house of the Austrian Parliament a bill prohibiting and emigration liable to have an adverse effect on military recruiting in Austria or calculated to promote the white slave traffic. Several interpellations on the subject of the operations of the Canadian Pacific Railway agents in Austria and demanding full information as to the result of the government's investigation, and the names of the Austrian officials alleged to have been involved in the transactions, were laid on the table of the House.
