

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



DRESS HELD UP AT BANGOR

Datuleships, London, Mar. 13&—The high water mark in naval expenditures which has been reached in the estimates for 1914-15, as brought forward in the House of Commons last night, is causing keen disappointment and con-cern to Liberal economists and Pacifi-sits. An account for the year just end-ing is a supplementary vote of £2,740, 000, bring the new estimates to the prodictious figure of £51,550,000, or 257,750,000. The plans of the First Lord of the Admiralty, Mr. Churchill, are viewed with suspicion all the more because of the meagre nature of the informa-tion and explanatory statements he has afforded. And not only is more money but more men domanded, the human increase to be 5,000, while the building programme will be composed of four battleships, four light cruisers and tweive destroyers.
