Peking, Aug. 24—The blockade of Tsing Tau, the fortified scaport of Kaio-Chow, has begun. British, French and Russian vessels of war are taking part in the movement. Up to the present time only British regiments have received orders to co-operate with the Japanese in the operations against Kiao-Chow on the land side. The French, however, expecting orders to assist the British. There probably will not be more than two or three regiments from each nation.
