OBITUARY.

George Mitchell.

George Mitchell, a well known bachelor of this city, died at his residence, 192 Brussels street, on the 13th inst. Mr. Mitchell came to St. John forty-two years ago from Aberdeen, Scotland, with his wife, who was Mary Anderson, of Lerwick, Scotland, and had been in business here until five or six years ago when he suffered a stroke of paralysis. Settling up his business matters, he retired to private life. Mr. Mitchell was a deacon in the Leinster street Baptist church for more than thirty years, and was known for his unobtrusive Christian kindness, a man of integrity in both private life and in the business community. A first cousin of Mr. Mitchell, Sir Alexander Lyon, was knighted by the king at the time of a royal visit to Scotland. Besides his wife the deceased is survived by a son, Robert A. E. Mitchell, commercial traveller for a business house in Toronto, who is expected to arrive here today. Mr. Mitchell was in the eightieth year of his age.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-Agency in the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Land Agency (but not Sub-Agency) on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence on or cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of not less than 80 acres or on a certain conditions.

When residence is a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$5.00 per acre.

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
