## **BOLSHEVIK ARE** READY TO QUIT Saying

re Majority Still in Favor of Holding Out-Many in Petrograd Die of Starvation.

Stockholm, Dec. 14—The Bolshevik leaders in Russia at present are engaged in heated discussions whether to abandon their entire regime, according to the Swedish naval attache at Petrograd, who has arrived here. Nikolai Lenine, the premier and Leo Kameneff, are said to favor abandonment, but they are opposed by war minister Trotizky, foreign minister Tchitcherin and M. Radek, who urge holding out to the last. The matter was brought before the central council of workmen's and soldiers' delegates and Lenine was defeated by the slight majority of twelve out of 200 votes.

The naval attache said there were many deaths from starvation from Petrograd, especially among the children and old people.
