He first suggested the invitation to the Queen to visit Can.; and the feasibility of a postal arrangement between England and the U.S., for the carriage of the Am. mails by Can. packets. As a strong Conservative he opposed the introduction of the elective principle into the L.C., Can., and was one of a small minority who opposed that measure in all its stages; he also opposed the secularization of the Clergy Reserves, and when that step was determined on, he was mainly instrumental in securing for the Eng. clergy the rights which were reserved to them. He carried the address to the Queen for the removal of the disabilities which prevented synodical action in the Church of Eng.; and he prepared and carried through its early stages, the Church Synod bill, and when the bill was reserved for the Royal Assent, he remained several months in Eng. to obtain the Queen's sanction.
