SOUTH BUXTON.

To-day has been a notable day in the history of Buxton, being the convention day of the local union of Raleigh and Tilbury Christian Endeavor Societies. The day was fine and people came in from all quarters. The Endeavor people here had busied themselves in preparing to give the visitors a hearty welcome. St. Andrew's Presbyterian church was most artistically decorated with hangings of various colors, flags, mottoes, bunting, flowers, etc., which presented a very beautiful appearance. About three p. m. Rev. D. Johnson, of Tilbury, the president, took the chair and opened the convention with singing, reading the 27th Psalm, and prayer by Rev. Mr. Scott, who also gave a hearty address of welcome to all, which was warmly replied to by Rev. Mr. Monroe, of South Buxton. After some preliminaries Mr. Monroe addressed the convention on the subject of missions and his broad and unselfish manner of address provoked a lively discussion, in which Mr. Burgess, of Rosedale, A. E. Robertson and Rev. Mr. Scott took a lively part. The chairman always bringing up the rear with a most powerful wind-up, for which he is noted. Mrs. McClelland, of Valetta, then read an able paper on Endeavor opportunities, which drew out much discussion, the chairman responding highly with fifty remarks. A paper by Mr. Burgess, of Rosedale, on Temperance, seemed to stir the whole convention, which read in part, "Resolved that we vote for no man for Parliament unless he is known to abstain from the use of intoxicating liquors." This subject was handled by J. M. Gare, Rev. Mr. Monroe, Ed. Hea, and the chairman, which provoked much interest and laughter. A very able and carefully prepared paper on Good Citizenship was read by Cassie M. Hill, and the subject was handled without gloves by Mr. Burgess, J. M. Gare and the chairman. J. M. Gare pointed out that while the British Government had done and was doing all in its power to advance civilization and promote the Christian religion, that the Christian body of the Province of Ontario had sacrificed the colored man, and that while Christ said "Love ye one another as I have loved you, and again, 'Love thy neighbor as thyself,' they had violated every principle of Christian love and, being largely in majority, they had closed the avenues of business life against the colored man, because it had pleased Almighty God to make the complexion of his skin a little different from theirs, and that in doing so they had not only sacrificed every Christian principle but had also put a stain on British honor. The chairman made a long and able reply, defending the love of Christ and placing the blame firmly on those who stooped to such an inhuman, un-Christian, un-British act.

Evening Session.

About 7.30 p. m. the chairman took his seat and opened the session with singing, reading and prayer, and then read the report of the nominating committee as follows: President, Rev. Mr. McGregor; Vice, Rev. Mr. Monroe; Secretary, Miss Cassie M. Hill, South Buxton; Treasurer, Mrs. Forbes. A vote of thanks was tendered the retiring officers, to which
