GARDEN NOTES.
Some people have the idea that to-
matos should be grown on poor soil.
This is a mistake. My experience has
been "it cannot be too good"; but the
vines will need severe pruning. Under
adverse circumstances last year, I
took the plants that came up in the
garden, self planted some time in June,
being very small at that time. As soon
as large enough I pruned them, leaving
only three branches, all the other
laterals being removed, preserving all
large leaves, and when three bunches
of blooms appeared, the end of the
branch was removed to prevent any
more bloom. The tomatoes will prob-
ably average four to each bunch,
which would be thirty-six good sized
tomatoes to each plant. It was the
best crop I ever grew, nearly every
one ripening.

on a postcard to thank me for a par-
cel, he adds: 'Three men have died
quite lately' he gives the names, all
men of the Queen's Regiment. Last
week news reached a mother through
Geneva that her son, a 'Queen's' pri-
soner had also died. No notification
of these deaths appears to have reach-
ed the War Office. A private, writing
to his wife about a month ago, said:
'For the love of heaven, send me
bread. If you knew what was going
on out here you would not wait to be
asked twice.' How many more of
our prisoners of war are to be allowed
to die without any effort being made
to save them."
